I have the honor to transmit herewith a letter dated the 22d instant from Miss Anne H. Stewart relative to her transfer and appointment to another position in the Indian service, and also relative to granting her the customary annual leave. Miss Stewart has been a competent and earnest teacher in her department at this school for six years and it is felt that she is entitled to any consideration that may be shown her in this connection.

It is suggested that her position might be continued through the month of July or until other arrangements can be made for her by your office. She would prefer a transfer without taking a further examination, but if an examination is necessary it is requested that arrangements be made for the same at the earliest practicable date.

To the Honorable

The Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Washington D. C.

Sir:- Yesterday June twenty-first I received notice that my position as Sloyd Teacher has been abolished and my salary to be discontinued June 30th 1905. At this late date nearly all school appointments outside of the Indian Service have been made so that my chances in that direction are fewer than they would have been a month ago. Such delayed notice seems unjust - particularly as my

Continued service here for six years would imply my record has been good. I put in my application for thirty days leave with pay. from June 27th to July 31st. We had been told to hand in our requests for annual leave and that they would be approved as usual.

Had I known a month ago it was not the intention of the Management to retain me, I should have resigned and requested annual leave as suggested in your circular letter No. 117 of March 15th 1905. From which I

quote. - "There is no objection to granting employees annual leave with pay for faithful work even if it is their intention to resign at the expiration of such time."

It seems to me hardly possible that manual training should be permanently taken from a school of this character. If all similar positions in the service have been abolished - will you be kind enough to tell me for what other position - if any - aside from that of teacher, I am eligible, and whether any further examination is required.
