
The Commissioner of Indian Affairs,

Sir:

I inclose herewith copies of correspondence relative to the entrance at Carlisle of a young Indian named Earl Clarence Davis. It seems that this case presents conditions which should be submitted to you for final decision. I am willing to take the boy and if it is a question of discipline only, I believe that we can apply it here. At the same time, of course, I do not want to interfere with any rights that Haskell may have in the matter, and the whole question is therefore submitted to you that you may decide whether, under the existing conditions, it will be any violation of the school rules or of Haskell's prior claim to the boy if he should be admitted here; and finally, whether, in your opinion, under all the circumstances, Carlisle should accept him.
