Sir:

Your letter of the 6th instant (Education 29327/06) from the Acting Commissioner of Indian Affairs, inclosing a letter from Philip Lazor of Hogansburg, N.Y., regarding a balance of \$58.54 due him from the school bank, is at hand.

Reporting upon this matter as directed, you are advised that this young man wrote to the school on March 22d asking that his money, a balance of about \$80 which he left at the school, be sent to him. In reply dated March 28th he was advised as to the record in his case, viz: That he was enrolled on Aug. 10, 1901, for the period of five years and that on April 4, 1904, he deserted from his country place and was discharged on May 20, 1904, for that reason; that he left a balance of \$58.54 in the school bank which was transferred to the Emergency Fund on May 18, 1904, previous to the time Major Mercer took charge of the school as superintendent. He was also told that it was doubtless well known to him that it was one of the invariable rules of the school that students who deserted thereby forfeited their personal effects and any moneys they might have here in the bank to their credit earned by themselves, and that in any event the money in question had been transferred as stated and his account closed previous to Major Mercer's taking charge so that he has no control over the matter.

Inasmuch as this young man undoubtedly knew that it was one of the rules of the school that any moneys belonging to him the proceeds of wages would be forfeited in the event of his leaving school without permission, it is thought that his application to have the money returned to him should be denied, especially as it has been transferred to another account and disbursed, and it is so recommended.
