
I inclose herewith a communication from the Superintendent of Industries recommending that Charles Dillon, Indian, a former Carlisle student, who is now assistant blacksmith, be appointed blacksmith. I have watched Mr. Dillon's conduct and his workmanship and I think he is fully competent to handle the work of the blacksmith shop here and to act as instructor. I consider it to the interest of the school that he be put in charge of the shop, and I recommend that he be appointed blacksmith.

If it is necessary for Mr. Dillon to take the civil service examination will you kindly have it arranged for me to hold a non-competitive examination and have the necessary papers forwarded at as early a date as possible.

In this connection I desire to countermand my request for a blacksmith to be selected from the eligible list.

Mr. Dillon will be satisfied with a salary of \$720 and in another communication I will recommend the necessary change in my list of positions and salaries for 1907.
