

Occasionally I have a request, so far amounting to about one a year, for the manufacture and sale of wagons or buggies to outside parties. I cannot find from the records of the office that the question has been submitted to you as to whether or no it will be proper for the school to make to order for and sell to the public, wagons or buggies. So far the demands of the Indian service are not quite sufficient to exhaust our supply and we usually have two or three vehicles that we have to make up in order to keep up the work of the shops for instruction of pupils. It has been customary to occasionally dispose of surplus wagons by an auction sale under due authority, but I now have an application for a wagon from a citizen of Carlisle.
