INSTRUCTIONS.

At the close of each year a report giving Farm Statistics will be submitted upon this form to the Indian Office.

This report will include the entire year's operations, and must be compiled from data actually collected and recorded during the year.

Superintendents will be careful to fill out every item of the report. Where there is nothing to report, that fact must be noted against the item or column affected. Schools that have no farm may note that fact across the face of the blank and return it to the Indian Office.

Value.—The value to the Government of products raised or manufactured on Indian school farms is equal to that which the school would have to pay were it necessary to purchase the same in open market. To secure a fair market value, and to establish a uniform scale of values for comparison from year to year, all values given in this report will be those of the local market at the time of harvesting each crop.

Superintendents will submit with this report a map or sketch of the school farm, showing its location with reference to the school; the location and area of the different parts of the farm, viz: timber, pasture or grazing, orchards, gardens, fields under cultivation, location of the different crops, etc.; also the location of farm buildings, fences, etc.

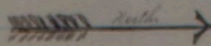

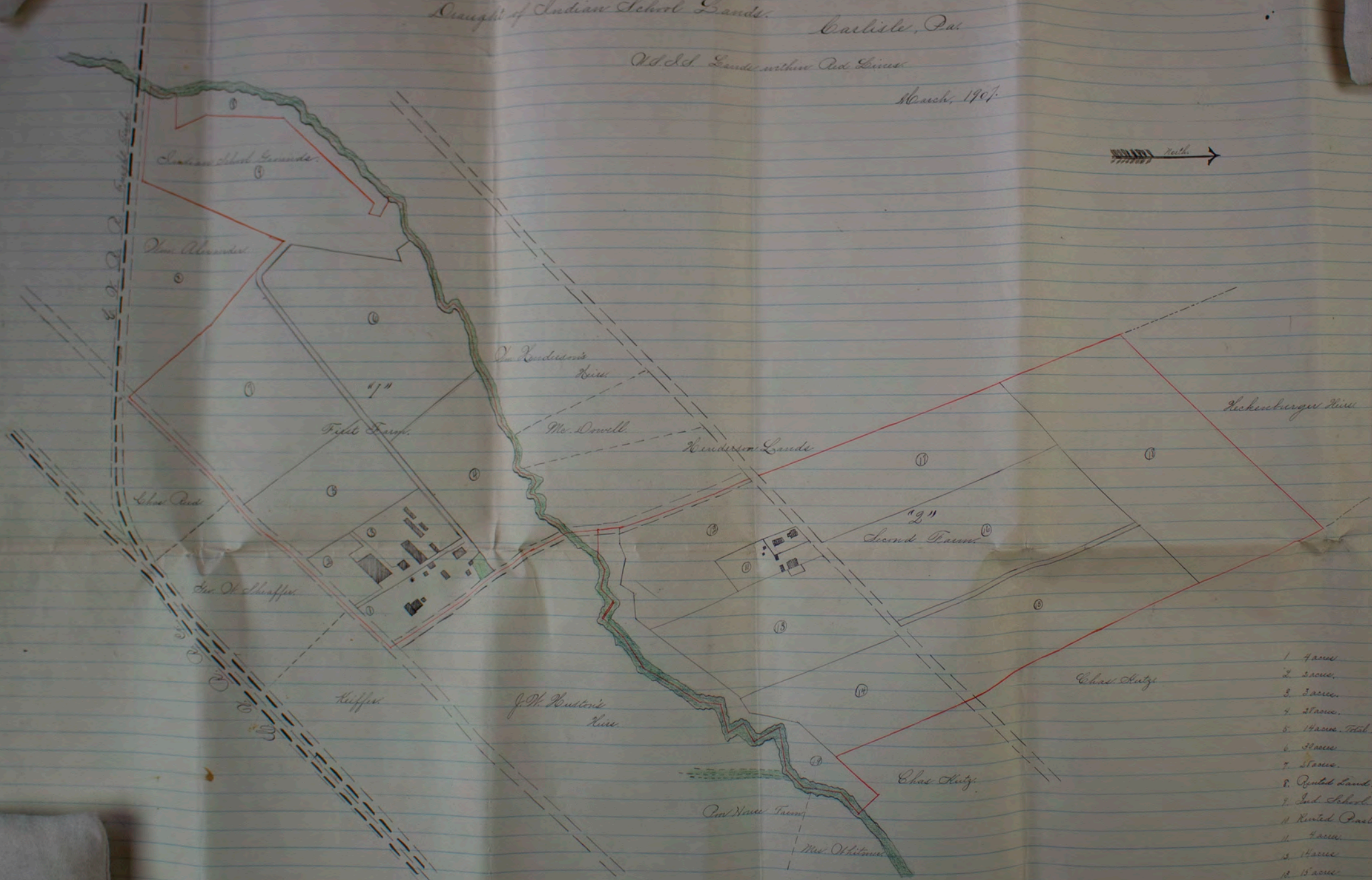
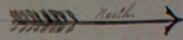
