Dear Sir:

A few days ago I was in to see you in regard to some information about Alice Jones, nee Tebbitts. The information that I desired was to know if the late Alice Tebbitts, was a full-blood Indian (Sioux). You told me that I would have to have more definite information before the same could be given at once.

I have found that the said Alice Tebbitts was the daughter of Tular and Essex Tebbitts, and a sister of one Tom Tebbitts, now living in Butte, Mont. There seems to have been three children of the late Tular and Essex Tebbitts, namely, Alice Tebbitts (deceased), Mary Tebbitts, nee Finckling (living in Jacksonville, Fla.), and Tom Tebbitts, of Butte, Mont. All of these children were educated at the Carlisle Indian School.

I would be very pleased if you could give me this information as soon as possible. As stated above, I only want to know if they are pure blood.
