I am desirous of taking some post graduate work at one of the universities here, but am unable to do so because I don't have my Carlisle diploma.

It was the policy at Carlisle, during the last three or four years of the existance of that institution to award a degree or a diploma to students, completing two years of their "Vocational Course", at Carlisle, after they had completed a course in engineering at the Ford Motor Co., they were awarded a diploma or degree in engineering, from Carlisle. This course was conducted under the "Outing System", of the Carlisle Indian School, under the direction of Mr. Oscar H. Lipps, Supt. at Carlisle.

When I completed the comme at the Ford Motor Co., which was during the World War in 1918 the Carlisle Indian School was closed, the students were transferred to others institutions, I don't know what became of the records, and was therefore unable to procure my diploma or degree, because of this situ -ation.

A diploma or degree is requisite to my ente -ring any of the graduate schools, which I have an opportunity to do at this time.
