Sir:

Reference is made to your letter of April 28, 1917, in which you direct attention to that paragraph of the Declaration of Policy in the Administration of Indian Affairs which refers to Indian students who have completed their course of instruction in the Government schools, being declared competent.

In accordance with these directions I have the honor to report that Agnes Hatch, a \(\frac{3}{4} \) blood Chippewa Indian, 18 years of age, passed her examinations and on May 24, 1917, was graduated from this school in Home Economics in accordance with the Tentative Course of study.

Agnes is the daughter of Charles and Catherine Cadotte Hatch of Sault St. Marie, Michigan. She has graduated from the Mt. Pleasant Indian School and worked in all of the industrial departments there. During the past two years she has worked in the sewing room at Carlisle and likes it very much. She does not like dishwashing. She would like to be either a school teacher or a seamstress.

Principal Blair reports that Agnes is a bright girl with considerable initiative and self-confidence enough to carry a thing through. She is conscientious about her work and takes pride indoing it well. She usually measure up to expectations. She needs competition to do her best as she is ambitious to excel.

Agnes is in good health, but not robust, she is careful in spending money.

Matilda G. Ewing reports that Agnes is a very refined and capable girl. She is pleasant, of a happy disposition and her ideals are high. She is industrious and economical. She is a capable seamstress, she makes friends and keeps them.

Superintendent Cochran reports that Agnes was at one time a pupil at the Mt. Pleasant School, and that she has no lands or allottments as far as he knows. He also advises me that she comes of poor parents and her home life was not of the best.

In view of the fact that Agnes is a Michigan Indian, with no property under the control of the government it would seem advisable to remove any estrictions upon her person, by the issuancy of a certificate of competency as soon as practicable.
