Sir:

Now when the Country needs all the aid that a patriotic people can bestow upon it why not restore the Carlisle Indian School to a regular military post.

Everything connected with these grounds is in good condition to receive, house and drill with profit and comfort from 1000 to 2000 men. Why destroy its usefulness to the nation by holding it perticularly at this time, as a school for the education of Indian boys and girls.

This suggestion may strike you as a foolish one, but what the country most needs at this time is trained men for active service, and I am not alone in the opinion that the change, if made, would not prove as foolish as some would have it appear.

What is now known as the Carlisle Indian
School, was established for a better purpose than the
one now assigned to it. It has a military history second
to no other in the nation. It began at a time that tried
men's souls and its patriotic page was shortened when

its purpose was diverted to other use than that of a military post, with a record of service beginning as early as 1764 with one officer and fifteen men.

Make Carlisle a Military post at this time and the old spirit of 1776 - 1812 - 1845 - and 1861 will respond with new life and vigor to the call of the President of the United States for brave men in 1917 - to defend the honor of the Nation's flag.
