Sirs:-

You are hereby appointed a board of survey to meet at the school warehouse at 2:00 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, February 16, 1911, and report upon certain unserviceable property for which M. Friedman, Superintendent of the Carlisle Indian School, is responsible. You are hereby directed to determine the proper disposition to make of the property, dividing it into the following classes:

- (a) Such as can be economically repaired and put to further use.
- (b) Such as can be used in making repairs.
- (c) Such as would be of some use to Indians, if issued to them.
- (d) Such as would bring a reasonable price, if sold at public auction.
- (e) Such as is utterly worthless for any purpose and should be condemned to destruction.
