The Office has received your letter, dated October 22, 1912, transmitting the report of the Board of Survey convened at the Carlisle School. The report is prepared in proper form, and is approved, as rendered.

In compliance with the recommendations of the Board, authority is granted for you to sell the following articles:

- 75 blankets;
- 2 sewing machines;
- 1 wagon, spring;
- 1 refrigerator,

either at public sale or through the medium of sealed bids. If the former method is employed, sufficient advertising should be made to insure competition or an up-set price which will be fair to the Government to be placed upon the articles prior to the sale.

The proceeds of the sale should be taken up after consideration of Sections 282 to 297, Indian Office Regulations effective April 1, 1904, together with the various amendments thereto.

Sirs:-

You are hereby appointed a board of survey to meet at the school warehouse at 9:00 o'clock this morning, October 21, 1912, and report upon certain unserviceable property for which M. Friedman, Superintendent of the Carlisle Indian School, is responsible. You are hereby directed to determine the proper disposition to make of the property, dividing it into the following classes:

- (a) Such as can be economically repaired and put to further use.
- (b) Such as can be used in making repairs.
- (c) Such as would be of some use to Indians, if issued to them.
- (d) Such as would bring a reasonable price, if sold at public auction.
- (e) Such as is utterly worthless for any purpose and should be condemned to destruction.
