The Office has received your letter of February 3, 1914, transmitting report of a board of survey recently convened at the Carlisle School. The report is prepared in proper form and is approved as rendered.

In compliance with the recommendations of the board, authority is granted for you to sell all articles listed under E. The disposition should be made either at public sale or through the medium of sealed bids. If the former method is employed you should advertise sufficiently to insure competition, or an upset price which will be fair to the Government should be placed upon the articles prior to the sale.

The proceeds of the sale should be taken up as "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 1".

The inclosed copy of this letter should be attached to the vouchers on which the supplies are dropped from your property return.

SIR:

It is requested that you appoint and convene a board of survey, composed of two or more disinterested and properly qualified employees of this jurisdiction, for the purpose of inspecting and recommending disposition of the public property inventoried herein, items 1 to 89, for which I am responsible, no article of which has ever previously been condemned and which I believe wholly unfit for further use in the Government service.

SIRS:

In accordance with above request you are hereby appointed to serve as a board of survey to inspect the public property listed herein, and recommend what you believe to be the best disposition thereof.

In recommending disposition you will divide the property into the following classes:

- (a) Such as is in sufficiently good condition to be continued in service.
- (b) Such as can be economically repaired and put to further use.
- (c) Such as can be used in making repairs.
- (d) Such as can be issued to able-bodied Indians in return for labor or to indigent Indians gratuitously.
- (e) Such as would bring a reasonable price if sold at public auction.
- (f) Such as is utterly worthless for any purpose and should be condemned to destruction.

When property is placed under class (c) and recommended for sale, a statement must be made of reasons why it is better to sell such property than to repair it, use it in making repairs, or issue it to Indians. When horses or mules are recommended for sale, statement must be made as to why, if unfit for Government use, it would not be better to destroy the animals instead of selling them to persons who might illtreat them.

Property placed under class (f) must be destroyed as completely as possible in my presence.
