Sir:-

In answer to Office letter dated October tenth, enclosing an anonymous letter which makes certain charges, I respectfully transmit herewith statements from the Visiting Physician, the Resident Physician, the Nurse, the Quartermaster, the Farmer, and the Disciplinarian.

The Disciplinarian's statement concerning the boy, Twomoons, is clear, and the statement that the boy's sickness resulted from his incarceration is, of course, without foundation.

The old guard house has been in use by the Indian School for a period covering more than thirty years, and it is to-day in a more sanitary condition than it ever has been in its history, as I have had installed concrete floors throughout. The new guard house is practically complete.

Relative to my attitude on the guard house, I attach hereto copies of telegrams received from the Indian Office on June 28, 1911, and my reply thereto on the same

equally absurd inasmuch as the first farm is so improved over the farm which I found on my coming to the school, that there is practically no comparison. The farmer's statement is accurate and truthful. The present farmer is faithful, industrious and efficient.

What is more important, however, is the situation in the hospital, and I endorse and approve the statements and recommendations made by the visiting physician in charge, Dr. A. R. Allen, in which he recommends that a change be made in the nurse.

I, therefore, recommend that at the earliest practicable moment the least that can be done is to transfer the present nurse to some other school. This is, of course, in the interests of the health of the student-body and of efficient administration of the hospital.

Dr. Allen is a man of authority and of prominence in this section, and the Government is fortunate in having such a man at the head of its medical work at Carlisle. He is a member of the State Board of Medical Examiners, Staff Physician to the Todd Hospital at Carlisle, and the most prominent surgeon in this part of the country.

Miss Guest's letter shows how entirely out of gear

All iron work, plumbing and mill work for new guard house absolutely essential for remodeling old. Present concrete floor would be cut to pieces installing plumbing. Old guard house on other side of campus from boys quarters to which drunked boys have to be carried entire length of campus. Old guard house on main traveled road where it is a continual nuisance to those in charge of discipline and a meeting place for students.

In reply to your letter of inquiry in regard to Wesley Twomoons, I beg to submit the following:- Wesley Twomoons was admitted to the hospital on September 15th. He was kept under close observation until the following morning, when a diagnosis of Double Pneumonia was made. Immediately on his admission, owing to one case of typhoid fever being in the hospital, a widal test was taken which proved negative. This was done to eliminate the possibility of typhoid fever being present, and, as stated above, the next morning, a positive diagnosis of Pneumonia was made. He received every care possible, was placed in a separate room, and a nurse detailed to keep a constant watch and take sole charge of his case. Owing to the extent of the Pneumonia, he developed cardiac and renal insufficiency. The resident saw him frequently day and night, and in addition to my visits to the hospital I kept in close touch with his condition over the telephone. 16th I made two visits. This boy received every attention possible, and nothing was left undone in his case. He died on September 17th. As to his condition previous to his entrance to the hospital, I am unable to give an authentic report.

In regard to the statement, "The young doctor has no good feeling for the Indian," I beg to say that this is a marked misstatement. Dr. Hess has always been intensely interested in all cases of illness of the pupils calling either at the dispensary or located in the hospital. He did play tennis during the summer months when sickness was very light, but he could always be reached if an emergency case occured. My instructions were to the effect that if at any time he was not available, a 'phone call to me in these cases would be answered promptly. Therefore this statement is markedly false, as any pupil who needed attention promptly could be attended to at any time within fifteen or twenty minutes from the time of the call, in accordance with my instructions. I have not yet been informed of a case that was neglected during my service.

The resident and the nurse have had several personal differences. This is a matter purely between them, and I have never interfered, feeling that the disputes were personal.

I wish, however, to say in this connection that owing to the head nurse's temperment, and her evident lack of training, which has shown up in a number of instances, she is not fitted to fill the position of nurse in a large hospital in the Service such as this is. There have been instances of insubordination and deficiency that had they occured in a modern hospital, they

would not have been tolerated. She is not fully qualified in many ways to take up the training of young girls in a way that should be done to make them of value to their home reservations and the Department, in the looking after the cases of trachoma, tuberculosis, etc., that are so common. A nurse to do this training should have the modern equipment and the mental equipose so necessary to handle these young people.

Since I have been in charge I have had to make a change in the pupil nurses, and substitute others owing to this deficiency, and have had trouble time after time with the pupil nurses, owing to what may be described as a nagging disposition and the want of the proper management of discipline.

In the larger operations done at the hospital, she is deficient and unreliable as to the proper methods of sterilization, and I have been compelled to order the resident to oversee and attend to all preparation of patients and material before operation on this account.

These are matters that I am loathe to mention. However, you hold me responsible for the medical service, and I feel that in this connection I should inform you as to conditions existing, over which I am responsible, and yet cannot improve. Owing to the conditionsI have mentioned, and because he could not rectify them, Dr. Hess sent in his resignation October 8th to take effect October 28, 1911.

Dear Sir:-

In reply to your letter will say that I have absolutely tended to my own business as medical resident on these grounds, and have tried in every way to do every thing for the Indian here. Examples are: The Rules and Regulations of the Hospital; the Tuberculin Treatment, instigated by Dr. Allen, and carried out in detail by myself. I suggested the Mt. Alto proposition although Dr. Allen did all of the active work in getting our tubercular pupils there.

It is a peculiar coincidence that until to-day,
I haven't played a game of tennis since the football season
started some six weeks ago. As for my manly qualities, others
may be the judge, and I did call Miss Guest a liar after she
had lied to Dr. Allen concerning me, and I did this in Dr.
Allen's presence. As to my work and manliness, I ask you to
consult Dr. Allen. Being disgusted to think that such an
incompetent woman as Miss Guest should be allowed to remain
in official charge of such an important institution as a

Hospital, I handed in my resignation to take effect in a months time.

When I applied for this position, I was advised as to Miss Guest's capabilities - which were practically nil.

Knowing all this, I asked her for her cooperation. She promised it. Her cooperation consisted in trying to make me do all the work. I did and have done more than my share, while she has tried to stir up animosity among the patients at all times. She has repeatedly insulted me to my face and behind my back, and has gone so far as to insult me in the presence of Mrs. Hess. She has never done a thing at the Hospital since I have been there for the good of the Service, while I have my records to show what little I have done.

Miss Guest personally seems very nice; professionally, she is intolerable.

As/my treatment of the patients, I have been strict but kind as I think they will all testify, and nothing has been too much trouble for me to do for them. I spend on an average twenty-four hours a day on the campus within easy reach of all who may be sick.

I's acres was plowed in the shring and sown to hear of oats for hog hasture then this was bed off this field was again plowed and seeded to affalfa. On seven acres which was plowed last fall hear o pats was blanted for hay, after making this hay the field was again herwed and seeded to alfalfa which with the acreage of alfalfa from last years makes a total of 36.82 acres now in alfalfa. 3/2 acres plowed in spring and sown to rape for hog pasture, after being fed off this field was plained again and of 4 /3 acres were plowed in the string and planted to corn, cow-pear & soy-beaux for

hog hasture, 5 acres were plowed in offring and planted to early & late potatoes after than esting the potatoles this field was plowed and somme to rue. 1/2 gares mere planted to truck crops, after harvesting this field was blomed again and sown to rue. 20 acres were plowed this spring which with 10 acres that were showed was planted to corn, From 15 acres of this com 125 ton of ensilage was made, filling the silt The other 15 acres have been cut a shocked for grain and dry bodder. 

I make the following statement with reference to the treatment of Wesley Twomoons.

At about 6:00 o'clock on the evening of Sunday, September 10, I heard a noise in the rear of the Shops which sounded as though someone was breaking down a door or was throwing stones against one of the buildings. On investigating I found a party of about four boys who were throwing stones against one of the buildings. I ordered the boys to stop throwing stones and to leave there. All of the boys left at once except Wesley Twomoons who refused to leave and began to curse me. On trying to reason with him he got worse whereupon I had him brought to my office. He continued to curse and be so exceeding abusive that I was compelled to direct the officers to take him to the Guardhouse by force.

During the evening I visited the Guardhouse twice and both times found him swearing and acting as though he were intoxicated. During the next day I visited him a number of times and found him insolent and abusive.

Early Tuesday morning I was detailed to leave the School on business and did not return until Wednesday afternoon. Buring my absence the boy was looked after by Jhan M.Rudy, my assistant who

says that he visited him frequently and did not find him complaining. I also visited him on Wednesday evening and did not find him complaining. On Thursday morning I took him out of the Guardhouse, brought him to quarters and had him to bathe. During the morning he did some light work around quarters. About noon he said that he did not feel well and I took him to the Hospital and turned him over to the Doctor.

The Guardhouse floor where he was kept was clean and dry and he was furnished with a mattress and sufficient blankets to keep him warm.
