About two weeks ago on the evening before Mr. Linnen appeared at Carlisle Mr. Warner, athletic director of the Carlisle Indian School through Clement Hill, asked us to come down to his house after study hour. There were present at his house that evening the following Indian School boys: Elmer Busch, Charles Coons, William Garlow, Clement Hill and Joseph Guyon. During the evening we discussed the lack of discipline in the large boys quarters and how we and the better class of boys at the school could use our efforts and influence to remedy the existing conditions.

During the discussion the petition which had been gotten up against the administration of the school was mentioned and Mr. Warner expressed the opinion that he did not think all the signers of that petition realized what they were signing and that many of them would sign most anything and he said that if a petition supporting Mr. Friedman's administration were to be circulated he thought a good many of the same boys would sign it, but Mr. Warner did not ask nor suggest that any steps to start such a petition should be taken by us or any one else and the main topic of the conversation duringthe evening was in regard to how we could better conditions at the school and especially the discipline at the large Inor Burch

boys quarters.

On this 10th day of February, 1914, Glenn S. Warner, bein duly sworn deposes and says:

About two weeks ago on the evening before Mr. Linnen appeared at Carlisle and without knowing that he or any other Inspector was coming to Carlisle for the purpose of an investigation, I suggested to Clement Hill, an Indian boy who is employed at the School, and a former pupil, that he bring to my house after study hour the following Indian School pupils: William Garlow, Elmer Busch, Charles Coons, and Joseph Guyon. These boys together with Hill came down to my house as suggested and during the evening we discussed the lack of discipline in the large boys quarters and how they and the better class of boys at the School could use their efforts and influence to remedy existing conditions.

During the discussion the petition which had been gotten up against the administration of the School was mentioned and I expressed the opinion that I did not think all the signers of that petition realized what they were signing and that I thought many of them would sign most anything if they were urged to do so. I said that if a petition supporting Mr. Friedman's administration were circulated I thought probably just as many boys would be willing to sign it and ptobably some of the boys who had signed the other petition.

I made no suggestion to them or to anyone else that such a petition should be started but on the contrary stated at the time that I did not mean my remarks to indicate to them any such suggestion. The talk about the petition was merely incidental to the main topic of conversation which was in regard to how we could work together to better coditions at the School and especially the discipline at large boys quarters.
