Q. Mr. Miller, were you present on Thursday, February 5, when I took the affidavit of one Claude M. Stauffer?

Mr. Linnen then asks, "You then refuse to sign this affidavit?" Mr. Stauffer answers, "Yes, sir, in its present form." Mr. Linnen states, "All right, you are excused."

Mr. Stauffer replies, "I will give you to understand you are not Superintendent here. You can't bluff us the way you have been doing things around here." Mr. Linnen states, "I told you, you were excused." Mr. Stuaffer states, "You can't bluff anybody around here. We know you. We are on to your game."

Mr. Linnen makes no reply. Mr. Stauffer,going, remarks; "Furthermore, you are no gentleman," and passing out of the door, he exclaims; "You are no gentleman, do you hear that?" . This is as near as I can recall the occurrence and conversation which there took place.
