Sir:-

In your letter of August 16, you recommended that the position of Assistant Teacher at \$480 per annum, remain vacant until you can look throughout the Service and find a competent Indian graduate for permanent appointment. Presumably you have not as yet found such a person, as in your descriptive statement of September 5, you submit the nomination of Miss Edith A. Bartlett, one of your pupils, temporarily. Assuming that Miss Bartlett is merely filling the position pending your further investigation, the Office has in mind a lady who is a graduate of the High School of this City, having taken a Normal course, who desires temporary employment. I will suggest that if this assumption is correct, that the Indian girl is merely there for the purpose of assisting, that Miss Ellis, the lady referred to, would make an excellent teacher for a month or two, which is about as long as the Office would care to retain her temporarily.

Miss Ellis is the daughter of the former Chief Clerk of this Office, and if you can without doing any injury whatever to the temporary appointee, utilize her services at Carlisle,
