In reply to Office letter, "Education 38758/08,"

(F.I.P.) dated June 11,1908, concerning the annual leave.

earned under the rules by Karl H. Baker, formerly printer at this school, I respectfully advise that I do not think conditions warrant granting such leave.

There has been some little delay in answering this letter consequent on the gathering of certain information concerning Mr. Baker's accounts.

that Mr. Baker did not account for certain funds which he received, and upon further inquiry, it was deemed advisable to look the matter up. A circular letter was accordingly sent to as many of the firms carrying advertising matter in the pages of our Arrow as we could find. This was done, firstly, to clear our records and put the paper on a firm basis, and, secondly, to ascertain whether, or no, these funds came into Mr. Baker's possession. I am sending you, under this cover,



a number of receipts and statements which were received in answer to this letter. I am also enclosing a statement made by Mr. S.J.Nori, clerk at this school, concerning the account of Mr. Baker, from all of which, it will be seen that Mr. Baker did not take up all the funds which he received. I had intended sending this information in sooner, but it has taken some time to collect it.

Information has also come to hand to the effect that Mr. Baker is indebted to a firm in Carlisle named Kronenberg to the extent of \$25.00, \$23.00 of which is for clothing and \$2.00 for the rental of clothing. This is shown on the statement of Kronenberg & Sons, which is found under this cover.

Mr. Baker also left without paying his board bill in the school club, which amounts to \$8.38; he is further indebted to one of our employees here on the grounds, Mr. John L. Walters, to the extent of \$15.00, and to another former employee, Mr. William Stimpel, for \$3.00.

I am bringing these things before the Department because I believe that other schools should be protected against the possible employment of a man such as he has proven to be.

I do not know that any action can be taken against Mr. Baker, or that any explanation can be demanded of him, but as

far as we have been able to gather, these are the facts.

In view of the conditions, I do not feel justified in recommending that he be granted annual leave, and I further respectfully recommend that before he is allowed to enter another school, careful inquiry be made concerning this matter.

In response to inquiries sent out to various advertisers in The Arrow, the attached correspondence with receipts in most all cases were received.

The money derived from the subscriptions, sales of post cards, advertisements in the columns of "The Arrow" were formerly accounted for by the person in charge of the printing office and at the end of each month the balance on hand was turned over to either Mr. Will H. Miller and Mr. Frank Hudson, Financial clerks.

On Dec.10, 1906, as per special order No.6, dated Dec.7, 1906, signed by W.A.Mercer, Supt. Mr.Karl H.Baker, printer was designated as Treasurer of "The Arrow" fund and the balance of \$203.21 was turned over to him by Mr.Frank Hudson then financial clerk. All receipts were accounted for by him and disbursed for special articles, stock, etc., that may be required in the printing department.

At the suggestion of the Department the balance in the hands of Mr.Baker of the & ove fund amounting to \$184.12 was taken up on government accounts as Miscelleanous Receipts Class 1V. (april 2.1907)

From the records of the cash book of the printing office, it is noted that since Oct.1906, funds derived from advertisement insertions in "The Arrow" have not been accounted for. The only funds received by the clerk in the accounts division of government funds were for subscriptions, renewals, sales of cards, job work, which have been deposited with the Asst.Treasurer, U.S., under the above named caption.

No response was received from Spaulding Bros. the largest advertisers in the paper.


