Dear Mr. Valentine:

Will you please advise he what jurisdiction. if any, the United States Government through the Indian Affairs Office has over the "United States Carlisle Indian Band" at Carlisle, Pennsylvania.

I am in receipt of information to the effect that a prominent citizen of my District supplied the Conductor of said Band with certain goods, for which the Conductor agreed to promptly remit check; that up to this time he has failed to receive the money; that recently he wrote the Conductor a letter requesting payment and in reply received a very insulting communication.

My constitutent has written me confidentially in regard to this matter, so you will oblige me by treating this in the same way. My object in writing is not to ask you to take any action hereon at this time, but to

ask that you ascertain for me who is responsible for this obligation, whether there is a fund belonging to the Government out of which it may be paid, or whether it will probably be paid out of private funds.

If you will advise me how my constitutent may proceed to collect his money I shall appreciate it.
