The Office is in receipt of your letter of March 1, 1918, with which were transmitted bills of the C.V. F. R. Co., in the amount of \$20.00, for derurage charges on coal shipped to your school.

It is noted in your letter that the company's agent agreed to look to Mr. Criffie or Mr. Griffin, the contractor, for all demurrage charges, and that the agent made several unsuccessful attempts to collect such charges from the contractor, finally calling upon you to collect the same for him.

It is suggested that the contractor might be induced to make settlement of these charges out of monies due him under his contract. Since you were aware of the agreement of the contractor to settle for demurrage charges, you should have satisfied yourself that such charges had been fully settled before you made final payment under the contract.


Sir:

On January 11, 1918, I received bills from the C. V. R. R. Co. in the amount of \$20.00 for demurrage charges on bituminous coal shipped to this school, as shown on the enclosed bills. At that time we had a contract with one John Griffie for hauling coal from the railroad siding to the school bins at the central heating plant, which is a distance of about 1/4 mile, and the contract provided that all demurrage charges were to be paid by the contractor.

On January 14, 1918, the contractor Griffie was caught stealing coal and was turned over for prosecution to the authorities in the town of Carlisle, and his contract abrogated.

At the time of making the contract the freight agent of the C. V. R. R. Co. was advised that Griffie was to pay all demurrage charges, and several efforts were made by the agent to collect the charges mentioned above, and finally submitted the matter to me. It appears that Griffie had paid all demurrage charges previous to those mentioned above.

Since making the contract Griffie has had his troubles in the matter of getting help and in getting the work done promptly, and I really believe the contract was a losing proposition to him, because we are now having to pay much more to get the coal hauled and the present contractor is having same trouble in regard to help.

My dear Mr. Francis;

The Office is in receipt of your letter of January 15, 1918, relative to the arrest of Mr. John Griffin by reason of his connection with the disappearance of certain coal, the property of your school, which Mr. Griffin had contracted to unload and haul in accordance with the terms of his contract No. 23630. In view of Mr. Griffin's action and the statement contained in your letter above referred to, it is deemed advisable that steps be taken toward the cancellation of Mr. Griffin's contract, and to that end there is enclosed herewith memorandum in quintuplicate agreeing to the cancellation of said contract, such memorandum to be signed by yoursself as Superintendent of Carlisle School and by Mr. Griffin as Contractor, both signatures to be properly witnessed, and the memorandum to be returned to this Office immediately.

In view of your statement that it was necessary to arrange with another person to carry on the work, the memorandum should be so dated as to cause the cancellation of Mr. Griffin's contract to be effective from and after the date of his arrest, not later than the date on which you found it necessary to engage the services of another person to handle the work. After Mr. Griffin has signed the memorandum and the papers have been forwarded to this Office, you should take the necessary step s towards entering into a new contract for this service, after due advertising and full compliance with the regulations. Services of this character between the date of the cancellation of Mr. Griffin's contract and the date of the new contract should be treated by you as open market transactions and handled accordingly. Please give the matter your immediate attention, and submit the memorandum properly signed at an early date.



Sir:

I have the honor to report the arrest last night of John Griffin of Carlisle and a driver working for him in connection with the unloading and hauling of coal from the Indian School siding to the storage bins at the central heating plant.

I have been fearful that by reason of the shortage of coal in this vicinity and the fact that the cars on the Indian School siding are located remote from the plant that someone might take advantage of the situation to steal coal. I directed the night watchman to watch the cars on the siding and take any other steps which might be necessary to apprehend any persons who might be stealing coal. accordance with my instructions he has been checking up the actions of all persons about the siding. Last evening he noticed one of the drivers of Mr. Griffin filling a sack with coal. Later he saw him place this coal, amounting to probably two bushels, into his wagon and start for home. therefore apprehended the driver and brought him to my office where the driver made the statement that he was acting under the instruction of Mr. Griffin, the contracter. The driver was placed under arrest and turned over to the local authorities and in view of his evidence, Mr. Griffin was arrested also. The driver was released on bail but Mr. Griffin was unable to obtain bail and is now in the county jail in Carlisle.





In view of the incarceration of Mr. Griffin, he is, of course, unable to handle his contract and it has been necessary to arrange with another person to carry on the work. This has been done with the consent of Mr. Griffin.

A hearing will be held in the case at Carlisle on Saturday afternoon.
