We the captains of football, track, and lacrosse teams under sign, wish to have Mr. Glen S. Warner to remain as Athletic Director of the Carlisle Indian School, providing that he is not connected with Mr. Friedmann in wrong doing that caused the students of this school demand for an investigation on the first week in January, beside the petition the boys send to Washington, D.C. for his removal

For several reasons we wish to have him remain as athletic Director of this school. The petition the boys got up against Mr. Warner was influenced by Gus Welch who had trouble with Mr. Warner that we don't know before the investigation take place at this school. When writing much against Mr. Warner outside of abusing him as a minor cases, which the boys sometimes deserve, some time Mr. Warner apologize to the boys when he makes a mistake. During the investigation Mr. Warner try to defend the athletic association

Sir:

Referring to your telegram dated March 11, relative to use of athletic funds in the construction of a grand stand on the school athletic field, I am enclosing herewith a letter addressed to me from Mr. G. S. Warner, Director of Athletics, in which he calls attention to the necessity for the construction of a new grand stand at once. This letter is referred to the Office for consideration in connection with the report of Inspector Linnen, and other data relative to this fund.

Mr. Warner also calls my attention to contracts already made for the spring lacrosse games, and for a coach for the lacrosse team. He states that they have agreed to pay \$35 per week and expenses for ten weeks services. He also states that the lacrosse season opens March 28 and that they have a number of games to play with various schools throughout this section of the country. I am informed that the receipts of the lacrosse games do not pay the expenses, and that it has been customary to draw on the general athletic fund to make up deficiencies.

Dear Sir:

In the matter of the proposed grand stand to replace the old bleachers upon the Athletic field, which were torn down because they had become dilapidated and unsafe, I desire to call your attention to the fact that one afternoon of commencement week is devoted to athletic sports, as a part of the commencement program. There is less than two weeks now intervening before the day set for the sports, and if the sports are to be held, it will be necessary to have the stand completed before that time, in order to accommodate the spectators and the students.

I understand the method of handling the Athletic funds is still under consideration by the Indian Office, but payment for the lumber would probably not be necessary before that matter is decided and the stand is a necessity and needed at once. There are plenty of athletic funds available, and I am bringing the matter to your attention again that you may do what you can to the end that the stand may be erected in time for the commencement sports and the opening of the Spring athletic season.



H. Foster is a teacher at this school and she has been receiving \$15.00 per month as extra compensation for work in connection with the Y. W. C. A; Chas. Coons is an Indian boy, pupil at this school, and has been receiving \$10.00 per month for work in connection with the gymnasium.
