CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

NAME.—This association shall be known as The Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.—The object of this association shall be the maintaining, promotion and advancement of amateur athletic sports at the Carlisle Indian School, and especially football, baseball and track athletics.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.—The membership of this association shall be limited to regularly enrolled students of the Carlisle Indian School, who have won their Varsity C under the rules laid down by the executive committee, together with the officers of the association, the superintendent of the school and the athletic director.

ARTICLE IV.

OBLIGATION OF MEMBERSHIP.—Each member of this association agrees to accept the rules, by-laws and regulations of the association.

ARTICLE V.

GOVERNMENT.—The association shall be governed entirely by its own constitution and by-laws, so long as the same do not conflict with the rules of the school, or of the Indian Office.

ARTICLE VI.

MANAGEMENT.—The management of this association shall be entrusted to an executive committee consisting of the officers of the association and the school superintendent.

ARTICLE VII.

ANNUAL MEETING.—The annual meeting of this association shall be held in some suitable building on the school grounds upon the first Monday in February of each year.

ARTICLE VIII.

SPECIAL MEETINGS.—A special meeting may be called at any time by the president, the school superintendent, or at the written request of three members of the association made to the secretary, provided that a notice of such meeting, and the object for which it is called, be sent to every member before the date assigned for the meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

AMENDMENTS.—No addition, alteration or amendment shall be made to this constitution at any meeting except by a two-third's vote of the members present, and the same must have the approval of the school superintendent.

BY - LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1.—The officers of this association shall be a President and a Secretary-Treasurer, who shall be elected by a majority vote of the members for the term of one year.

SECTION 2.—The officers shall be selected from among the employees of the school, or of the association, and their selection must be approved by the superintendent, provided that the school superintendent shall not be eligible to either the position of president or Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1.—Duties of officers. The president shall preside at all meetings of the association and order meetings of the association and executive committee whenever in his judgment he may deem it necessary.

SECTION 2.—The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the minutes of the association and shall conduct such correspondence as pertains to the collection of accounts and the payment of bills, and he shall have charge of and be responsible for all books and shall collect and have charge of all the moneys and evidences of indebtedness belonging to the association. He shall keep an accurate account of all moneys received and shall pay all bills

when properly approved and submit a report thereof to the executive committee whenever called upon to do so.

SECTION 3.—All bills shall be audited by the President and when approved by him, the Treasurer shall submit the same to the school superintendent for his approval. In case of approval, he will affix his signature and date, after which the Treasurer shall be authorized to pay by check which must be countersigned by the President.

SECTION 4. — The Secretary-Treasurer's books shall be audited at the end of every month by an auditing committee consisting of the school superintendent, the president, and one representative citizen of Carlisle, who shall be chosen by the executive committee.

SECTION 5. — The Secretary-Treasurer's books shall be open at all times to examination by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs or his representative.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1.—The executive Committee shall assume entire control of the management of the association, shall select such employees of the association as are needed for carrying on the work and object of the association, but the superintendent alone shall have the power to select the Athletic Director of the school whose duties it shall be to manage the outdoor athletic teams of the school, attend to the purchasing of equipment and supplies and to supervise the coaching and training of the

outdoor athletic teams of the school, subject to the supervision and control of the executive committee.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to see that the affairs of the association are so managed as not to interfere in any way with the rules of the school, of the Indian Service, or in any way which could be detrimental to the best interests of the students of this school, or to the cause of Indian education.

ARTICLE IV.

There shall be a student advisory committee consisting of the captains of the football, baseball and track teams, which shall meet with the executive committee whenever called upon to do so. This committee may also meet whenever they see fit and make such recommendations to the executive committee as they may decide upon.

ARTICLE V.

The executive committee may, in its discretion, devote any part of the surplus moneys of the association over and above what are necessary for the maintenance of athletics at the school, for the welfare of the school, or the students thereof, provided that if money is appropriated for use for any purpose whatsoever outside of athletics this expenditure must have the approval of the superintendent before a contract is entered into or material is purchased.

ARTICLE VI.

It is understood that this Constitution and these By-laws are adopted for the purpose of making a formal organization of the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association, which has been in existence in an informal way for some years under about the same rules and regulations as here laid down. The old association is hereby merged into this formally organized association which shall and does assume all assets, debts, contracts and obligations of said association.

ARTICLE VII.

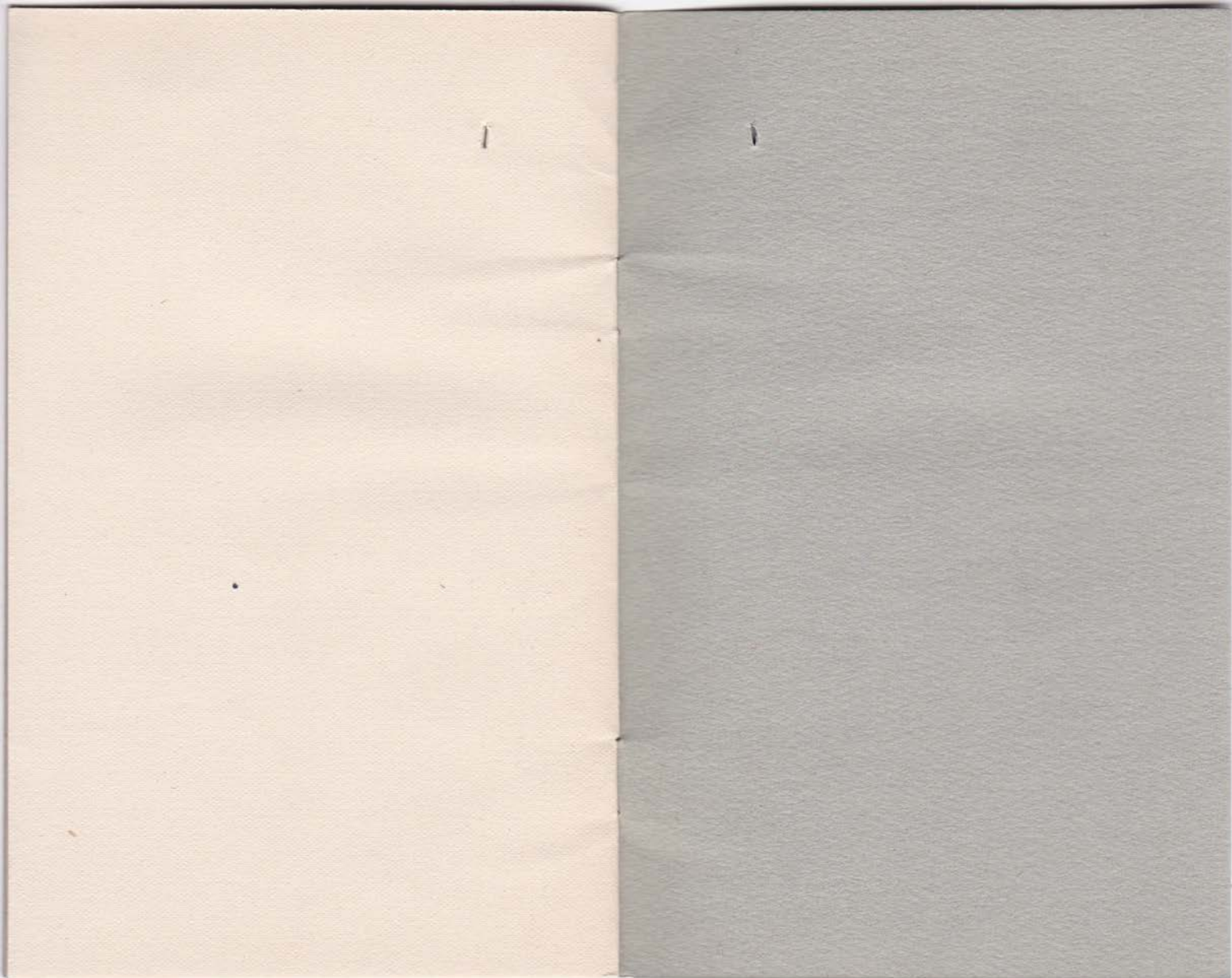

ARTICLE VIII.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

Amendment 38 to Indian Office Regulations 1904, provides that the proceeds of athletic contests and entertainments by or in behalf of pupils may be received and expended by the officers of the organizations without being carried in the official account of the disbursing officer, provided that such funds do not come into the hands of the disbursing officer, and he exercises no control over them, except in an advisory capacity. The effect of this amendment is to revoke the special regulations governing the receipt and disbursement of the proceeds of athletic contests, etc., at your school, approved by the Department on April 6, 1914, and to authorize you to drop these funds, now carried as "Special Deposits-Athletic Association" from your official account.

You will be required, however, to keep these accounts on file in your office and to render quarterly

itemized statements to this Office, showing all receipts and expenditures in connection with athletic contests and band concerts.

I hereby certify that the following resolution was unanimously passed at a meeting of the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association held in the Y.M.C.A. hall at 4:10 P.M. April 8th, 1914.

RESOLVED; that sections three and four of article II of the by-laws of the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association be and the same hereby are repealed and in lieu thereof the following regulations approved by the Secretary of the Interior April 8th, 1914 are hereby adopted and made a part of said by-laws of said association.

ARTICLE II; SECTION 3, Hereafter the gross proceeds of athletic contests and entertainments by or in behalf of pupils of the Carlisle Indian School shall be taken up in the cash accounts of the Superintendent as "Special Deposits, Athletic Association" and an itemized schedule showing all receipts and disbursements of said moneys during each quarter or fractional quarter, must be filed with the Superintendent's cash account on form 5-139 which shall be modified as necessary to meet this requirement. Such schedule must show the date and amount of each receipt, for what and from whom received, the date and amount of each payment, for what and to whom paid. Certificates of payors covering all monies paid by them to the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association must be furnished on form 5-238b and attached to the schedule. Receipted bills with the Superintendent's approval endorsed thereon, properly itemized as to quantities and rates for all payments in excess of \$5.00 (to be prepared on form 5-927 when practicable) must be filed with the schedule. If payments are made from personal funds a reimbursement voucher in favor of the person incurring the expense must be furnished and payment thereon made by check. If cash payments are made from athletic funds a subsidiary cash statement showing such transactions must be attached to the schedule.

The funds in question shall be deposited in a bank bonded to the United States, to the credit of the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association, and the Superintendent or other officer in charge of the school, is hereby authorized to approve checks drawn against such bank account when signed by the duly authorized officer or officers of the Association for such purposes and in such amounts as in the judgement of the Superintendent may be necessary and proper; provided that this fund shall not be used for payment of the salary or any part of the salary of any regular employee until prior authority for such payment has been granted by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.



ARTICLE II, SECTION 4, All bylaws or parts of bylaws of the said Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association which are in conflict with the foregoing are hereby waived.

Sir:

A recent investigation of affairs at the Indian School at Carlisle, Penna., discloses the fact that the proceeds of athletic contests and entertainments by or in behalf of pupils of that school are not accounted for in a manner satisfactory to this Office.

For several years these moneys have been handled by an incorporated association of the pupils, the Superintendent merely exercising a supervisory control over the receipts and expenditures. Existing conditions indicate that this method is not a sufficient accounting and that these funds should be brought under the direct control of the Superintendent, and maintained in a manner similar to that which governs Individual Indian Money. With that end in view, I have the honor to request the approval of the following regulations:

Hereafter, the gross proceeds of athletic contests and entertainments by or in behalf of pupils of the Carlisle Indian School shall be taken up in the cash accounts of the Superintendent as "Special Deposits,


Athletic Association," and an itemized schedule showing all receipts and disbursements of said moneys during each quarter, or fractional quarter, must be filed with the Superintendent's cash accounts, on form 5-129, which shall be modified as necessary to meet this requirement. Such schedule must show the date and amount of each receipt, for what and from whom received, the date and amount of each payment, for what and to whom paid. Certificates of payors covering all moneys paid by them to the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association must be furnished on form 5-238b and attached to the schedule. Receipted bills, with the Superintendent's approval endorsed thereon, properly itemized as to quantities and rates for all payments in excess of \$5.00 (to be prepared on form 5-927 when practicable), must be filed with the schedule. If payments are made from personal funds, a reimbursement voucher in favor of the person incurring the expense must be furnished and payment thereon made by check. If cash payments are made from athletic funds a subsidiary cash statement showing such transactions must be attached to the schedule.

to approve checks drawn against such bank account when signed by the duly authorized officer or officers of the Association, for such purposes and in such amounts as in the judgment of the Superintendent may be necessary and proper; provided that this fund shall not be used for payment of the salary, or any part of the salary, of any regular employee until prior authority for such payment has been granted by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Any sections of the Regulations of the Indian Office, 1904, or the Regulations concerning the handling of Individual Indian Money, approved July 14, 1913, which are in conflict with the foregoing are hereby waived.



Replying to your letter dated February 26, 1914, relative to funds transferred to me by the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association and deposited to my account in the Treasury as "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 4," I have to advise that the draft of proposed regulations governing the accounting of these funds has been carefully examined by me, and if the Office has definitely determined to have the funds accounted for under the heading, "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 4" I find no objections to the provisions of the proposed regulations. I am assuming that this regulation would either be an amendment to Section 289, Regulations of Indian Office, 1904, or a special regulation with the provisions of Section 291 made applicable. The only objection I can see to handling these funds as "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 4," is that when I am relieved as Supervisor in Charge, it will be necessary for me to deposit them to the credit of the United States Treasurer, and they will then be designated "Indian Moneys, Proceeds of Labor,-

Ech

School," and cannot thereafter be expended except after authority has first been secured from the Office, and in compliance with the regulations requiring competitive bids.

The only other method of handling these funds that I have yet been able to suggest is that the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association be considered an individual Indian, and the funds handled as an individual Indian bank account. This Association is composed of Indian pupils of the Carlisle school; it is incorporated under the laws of the State of Pennsylvania, and I am very anxious to avoid any legal complications that might possibly arise. While the Association has turned these funds over to me, it has not authorized me to expend them, and the question arises whether or not I would be liable for making any expenditures, if the Association should object to their expenditure by me, or could the Association secure a restraining order from a court of competent jurisdiction and restrain me from expending any of these funds? These are questions I have been considering, and am simply calling them to the attention of the Office in order that any complications that might arise may be avoided.

I have prepared a rough draft of proposed regulations governing the accounting for these funds as "Individual Indian Moneys,-Carlisle Indian School Athletic Associa-

tion," and enclose the same herewith for your consideration. I have also had prepared a schedule on form 5-129 illustrating how it is proposed to account for the expenditure of these funds. This schedule is a true transcript of the ledger account of the Athletic Association for the fractional quarter ending February 13, 1914. The items of expense would, of course, be evidenced by itemized receipted bills or subvouchers. Under this plan the Office would have the same supervision of the fund as though it were accounted for as "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 4." In the event items of expense were deemed by the Office improper, it could call for further justification or prohibit entirely the expenditure of funds for such purposes as it would not deem advisable. Under this plan the money would be expended with the consent of the Association and in accordance with its by-laws, and any legal complications would thus be avoided.


Superintendent E. A. Allen, of the Chilocco Indian School, has been a visitor here for the past two days, and I consulted him in reference to this matter. Mr. Allen was formerly assistant superintendent of this school and understands fully the difficulties in the way of satisfactorily and successfully carrying on the business of the Athletic Association under Office regulations. He agrees that the Office should supervise the expenditure

of these funds, but that the regulations should be just as liberal as they can possibly be made, keeping in mind the legitimate use of the funds. He was of the opinion that if this fund could be handled as an individual Indian bank account in the manner herein outlined, it would prove entirely satisfactory and at the same time the Office would be in a position to exercise the same supervision in regard to expenditures as if it were handled as "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 4."

Another feature to be considered is that if this fund is retained in the Treasury as "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 4," it will draw no interest. If deposited in a local bank as individual Indian money, it will draw interest at the rate of three percent per annum on average daily balances, which will amount to five or six hundred dollars per year. This is an item worth considering.

There may be some reason why this fund cannot be considered an individual Indian bank account, but if it is within the power of the Department to so designate it, I recommend that the enclosed proposed regulation be submitted for approval with such changes as the Office may deem advisable. It is very important that this matter receive prompt consideration and that I be advised as soon as possible as to the action taken by the Office.

Special Deposits, Hereafter, the gross proceeds of pupils' athletic contests and entertainments on account Carlisle Indian School must be taken up in the cash accounts of the Superintendent as "Individual Indian Moneys, - Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association," and an itemized schedule showing all receipts and disbursements of said moneys during each quarter or fractional quarter must be filed with the Superintendent's cash accounts on form 5-129. This schedule must show the date of receipt of money, from whom received, for what paid and amount paid. The certificates of payors covering all moneys paid by them to the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association must be furnished on form 5-238b and attached to the schedule. Receipted bills properly itemized as to quantities and rates for all payments of \$5.00 or more are required and must be filed with the schedule.

The Superintendent, or other Officer in charge of the Carlisle Indian School, is hereby authorized to approve checks drawn against the bank account of the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Association, when signed by the duly authorized agent of the Association, for such purposes and in such amounts as in his opinion may be necessary for the proper conduct of athletic and other student organizations of the school. *Officer or officers*

Except as herein otherwise provided, the Regulations concerning the handling of Individual Indian Money, approved July 14, 1913, shall apply.

My dear Mr. Meritt:

I am still in a quandary as to the handling of the athletic funds. Quite a number of bills have been presented for payment, and I doubt if some of them would pass the Auditor if submitted on vouchers in the usual form. It just occurred to me that the Office might grant me authority to pay to the Athletic Association a thousand dollars to be expended for its benefit in accordance with the by-laws of that organization. 

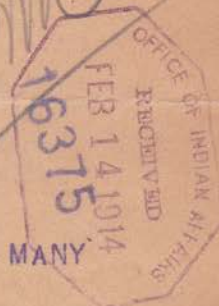

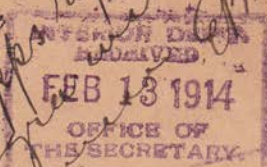

In response to your inquiry as to the use of the athletic funds to pay the expenses of boys who receive some special training in physical culture at the Chautauqua Summer School or elsewhere, and as to payment for care of the gymnasium and assistance in athletic work, you are advised that the Office considers the athletic fund should properly be used for matters which are of a general benefit to the school, and not for matters which are of benefit to the individual. Even though the School might receive incidental benefit from the training which should be furnished to individual pupils, yet the expenditure for such individuals could hardly be considered an expenditure for the general benefit of all the students. It is thought this distinction furnishes the proper criterion for your guidance.

As to the care of gymnasium and assistance in athletic work in the gymnasium, this is evidently a charge for work necessary to be done, and is a proper one.

I desire to be advised to what extent the Office thinks it advisable to use the Carlisle Indian School Athletic Fund for the purpose of assisting worthy students in taking special courses at other schools and institutes. For example, in the past, a few boys have been sent to the Chautauqua Summer School to take special training in physical culture and their expenses have been paid from the athletic fund. The training of a few students along this line has been an excellent thing for the school, as they have returned here and conducted classes in physical culture in the gymnasium in a very creditable manner. It has also been customary to pay one of the students \$10.00 per month from the athletic fund to take care of the gymnasium and assist in the physical culture work.

I desire to know if the Office will approve the continuation of this custom. I consider it very important that we have a good, reliable young man in the gymnasium to assist with the physical culture work and to take care of the apparatus. I believe also it would be a fine thing for the girls of the school if we could send one or two of them



to the Chautauqua Summer School for courses in physical culture, and use them as instructors upon their return.

If the athletic fund is not used for some such purposes as I have indicated, I cannot see wherein it can be used to any great advantage for the benefit of the student body. Please advise me as soon as possible regarding this matter.

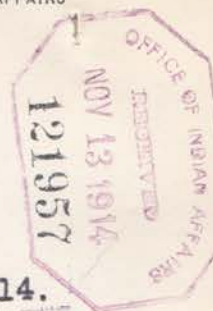

You will recall that in my report of conditions on the Carlisle Indian School I mentioned, among other things, to show the various uses--improper and otherwise--of the athletic funds, that payments had been made to practically all of the Protestant ministers at Carlisle for holding Sunday services.

I did not in any manner intend to reflect against the ministers of Carlisle or the good people there who had been engaged in doing a good work among the pupils at the Carlisle Indian School.

It appears that one of the ministers--Rev. Kellogg of the Second Presbyterian Church--refunded to the Supervisor in Charge at Carlisle the sum of \$65 which he had been paid, and that Miss Cowdrey, who had been engaged in Y. W. C. A. work, refunded the sum of \$180 to the Carlisle Indian School.



I personally feel that these moneys should be returned to Rev. Kellogg and Miss Cowdrey, and I have the honor to recommend that you so instruct the Supervisor in Charge at Carlisle.

It was not my intention to place this matter before the public in such a light as could be construed to cause the ministers and Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. workers to feel humiliated or to return these moneys. I feel that their work has been performed with only the highest motives, and I am very frank to say that if all moneys of the Carlisle Athletic Association had been used for as good and worthy a purpose there would have been no criticism or cause for complaint.
