Sir:-

In compliance with your instructions of the 1st. inst., I arrived at this school on the night of the 3rd. inst. and on the following day began the examination of the books and accounts of this Institution beginning with the first quarter of 1908 and completing with January 31, 1908, the date when Major Mercer relinquished charge here. I have carefully examined every voucher during this period of seven months comparing the amounts charged with the stubs of each check issued in payment of such voucher, checked up the cash book and have found no irregularities. I did not make the examination with a view to ascertaining whether expenditures had been made without authority or to see if authorities granted had been exceeded, knowing those points would develop in the examination given by the administrative office. My examination was on the line of ascertaining if all public funds coming into the hands of the late Superintendent, had been properly accounted for and unexpended balances deposited at the close of his administration or turned over to his successor.

I was engaged on the School Accounts proper during the first week of my visit and then took up the individual accounts of the pupils, and other accounts not carried in the cash accounts of the Superintendent on which I shall report under separate heads.

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SCHOOL CASH ACCOUNTS.

The examination of these accounts shows that the Superintendent accounted for all public moneys coming into his possession, so far as the accounts themselves showed and from a comparison of the statement of public funds remitted him. From all I can learn he has also accounted for all miscellaneous receipts from sales of all kinds.

The following is a statement of the amount of the different funds for which the late Superintendent was responsible January 31, 1908, and the disposition made by him of them:-

These balances agree with my audit. The \$1202.46 is not Individual Indian money but is what is termed the "Emergency Fund" and I have directed that it be so taken up on the next Account Current to avoid further confusion.

MISCELLANEOUS CASH.

This is money that is paid in by the parents of Indian pupils or by the pupils themselves as a guarantee for the payment of the pupils' ^{ticket} to and from their homes when they go back to their

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homes before their time is up at the school otherwise than for sickness. The amount of this fund, in a drawer in the office safe is \$300.60 and belongs to the following named pupils:-

This money after it has been received is turned over to Mr. Will H. Miller, the bookkeeper and cashier who makes a record of it in a memorandum book. It does not enter into the Superintendent's account neither is it placed in the bank and I find it has often been "borrowed" from to meet a loan to a pupil or to buy a ticket for an outgoing employe or graduating pupil who has no funds in the bank to his or her credit.

Of the \$300.60 that should, according to the memoranda, be in the safe I found only \$243.72. The balance is represented as follows:-

First: A pencil note that \$31.88 is due the fund for expenses of transporting the remains of a deceased Pawnee pupil to his home by express. The express charges on the body were double one first class fare or \$63.76. One half of this was paid by the Superintendent from his school fund and the remainder was guaranteed by the Superintendent at Pawnee. So the \$31.88 was paid from these personal funds that in reality belong to those named above. The boy had to his credit in the bank here \$168.94 and the Superintendent at Pawnee has assured the Superintendent of Carlisle that when an

administrator has been appointed, the indebtedness will be liquidated.

Second: A note given to Major Mercer by Dolly Jackson dated December 7, 1907 for \$20.73 for money advanced her to pay her railroad fare from Carlisle to St. Louis, she having been appointed upon her graduating from this school as a matron at Rainy Mountain School. She promised in the receipt given Major Mercer to return the amount at her earliest convenience. No part of it has thus far been reimbursed.

Third: There has also been advanced to Frances Ghangraw by Major Mercer from this fund, \$4.27 for her graduating costume last spring. A note in the cash box from Mr. Miller to a teacher calling attention to this indebtedness shows that the matter was referred to Major Mercer who sent it back to Mr. Miller with "O.K., W.A.M." on it meaning by implication that he would be responsible for it. The girl is gone and Major Mercer should make the amount good.

The other two amounts are amply secured unless Dolly Jackson should lose her position. I have directed that her attention be immediately called to the debt and request made for prompt settlement.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I recommend that this money be placed in the bank in the same manner as the other moneys of pupils subject to no disbursements excepting for the purpose for which it was originally intended.

EMERGENCY FUND.

This fund was created in the early days of Colonel Pratt by confiscating any moneys that runaway boys and girls had on de-

posit. The original idea was to use the fund for capturing and returning such runaways.

During Special Agent Olive's examination of the accounts of the pupils of this school it was disclosed that many accounts were overdrawn. In order to reimburse these overdrawn accounts, the total deficit was made good from this emergency fund, amounting to \$756.45 and the deficit in the "Umbrella Account", \$293.00 was also charged to it leaving a balance on January 1, 1907 of \$279.84. The pupils have refunded to square their overdrawn accounts \$266.93. Two interest checks were received from the Girard Trust Company of Philadelphia for interest prior to Dec. 31, 1906 amounting to \$1026.02. This amount was placed to the credit of this emergency fund by Mr. Hudson, then bookkeeper and cashier instead of being distributed among various depositors. The Girard Trust Company kept no individual accounts and the bookkeeper was too badly involved in other matters to give it the proper attention. With these credits the Emergency Fund stood on January 31, 1908,

The expenditures are too manifold to go into details but I am of the opinion that the money should not have been used for the purposes shown. Whether this school can confiscate the moneys of its runaway pupils which they have received as annuities, lease rentals or from treaty sources, is debatable. The question has been before the Office before and it has apparently sanctioned the method.

Some claims have been made by boys for their confiscated money and it has been refunded.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I recommend that the amount of \$1026.02 which was wrongfully turned into this fund, be divided among the depositors so far as it is possible now to do so and that any unexpended balance be held to be used only for returning runaway pupils, when no other funds are available and I further recommend that only such funds as runaway pupils have to their credit as payment of wages be confiscated, their treaty and land funds to simply be withheld for such time as may be deemed proper.

INDIVIDUAL INDIAN MONEYS BELONGING TO PUPILS.

The examination of these accounts was taken up from the date of their last adjustment by Special Agent Olive, January 1, 1907, to see that the balances as found by him as due each pupil were properly credited on the new ledgers that were opened after the funds were taken from the Girard Trust Company and deposited with the Merchants' National Bank of Carlisle, Pa. After this had been ascertained to have been correctly done, I took up the credits. These came from various sources, such as checks from the Agents and Superintendents, for annuities, checks sent direct to Indian pupils for their rentals, money orders, registered letters, wages paid to the outing pupils, wages paid by employes to pupils for services &c. Mr. Miller keeps a day book of all such credits and also all debits, but the sources of such receipts are not shown otherwise to indicate their character.

Beginning with January 1, 1907, I had the letter files searched for all letters from every source transmitting money to

pupils. These were checked up to the day book, as were the pay rolls of the school during the summer vacation on which appeared payments to pupils for their labor. This method was laborious and slow but I knew it was the only way to detect discrepancies. Again, I found large amounts that had been received by pupils direct from their parents or others and turned over by them to the Superintendent. In every instance where I found no written record of such deposits, I called on the pupils to verify the amounts and they invariably corroborated the figures. I may have devoted more time to these funds than was absolutely necessary but the accounts under the new system of keeping them had not been audited for thirteen months and I wanted to see that they were clean and straight up to January 31, 1908. Short cuts to that end could have been made by taking office and bank balances but that would not have convinced me of their correctness until I had checked off all credits. Before my arrival the bank had not turned in a statement of its paid checks. I called on them for the checks they had paid, compared and checked them off with the stubs and ascertained the outstanding checks and amounts, thus verifying the balances. The balance as shown by the inclosed individual statement of accounts was ascertained to agree with that of the bank.

None of the money represented by the figures shown has been received from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs and therefore has no connection with his personal official account.

With the audit that has been given these accounts it will be an easy matter the next time to begin on February 1, 1908 and proceed with a further audit.

Interest on these individual accounts is at 3% per annum on daily balances. I have computed the interest on several of the

accounts and found it correct. This is absolutely a fair way to compute interest and although it involves much work when you consider that nearly one thousand accounts have to be calculated, the bank prefers to do it rather than on average balances or balances on hand when the interest payment period has arrived.

In checking over the letters transmitting money to pupils, everything checked up with one exception of \$5.00. This amount was transmitted by Joel W. Tyndall for his son and the letter has a notation on it "I have the \$5.00, J.R.W." As it did not appear in the cash book, I called Mr. Wise's attention to it and he said he thought and believed he gave it to the boy when he was dismissed from the school but admitted he had no evidence of the boy having received it. He has written to the boy's father to get an acknowledgment of its payment from the boy. I believe this is merely an oversight on the part of Mr. Wise to obtain a receipt at the proper time and that the matter will be cleared up when he hears from Mr. Tyndall.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

It is recommended that all letters from Agents or others transmitting checks, money &c, after being recorded be turned over to Mr. Miller and kept by him as a special file in readiness for comparison with his books at all times thus saving the time and work of pulling them out of the general letter files.

That the Merchants' National Bank be requested to submit a statement of all checks paid by it once every two months and to keep the pass books posted up every two months.

No recommendations are submitted nor criticism offered on Mr. Miller's work. His books are neatly and correctly kept show-

ing more than average ability and familiarity with his work, coming from a long experience in railroad business. His present salary is \$940 per annum and I would recommend it be increased to \$1000. He is under a \$10,000 bond, the premium on which has heretofore been paid out of the so called "Emergency Fund" \$25.00. With this slight increase he could pay for his bond and have a small increase of salary. He is worth it.

UMBRELLA ACCOUNT.

I have made mention of \$293.00 being paid from the "Emergency Fund" to square up and close out this account. The ledger account of this fund shows that between September 25, 1905 and November 6, 1906, umbrellas to the number of 1200 were purchased from a local dealer at a cost of \$600. They were paid for from the funds belonging to the pupils in the Girard Trust Company. Between the dates given the pupils reimbursed the fund to the amount of \$307.00 leaving \$293.00 worth of umbrellas unpaid for.

ATHLETIC FUND.

This fund represents the receipts received by the football and base-ball teams for games played with other teams and a small amount from sales at the Leupp Art Studio. The fund at the close of January 31, 1908, was as follows:-

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These securities are in the Carlisle Deposit Bank and Supervisor Dickson has receipted for them together with \$23.73 on deposit with the Merchants National Bank of Carlisle, Pa.

As a matter of fact, the Superintendent has but little to do with these funds other than a general supervision of the disbursements, his approval being necessary on all bills before they can be paid. Checks are drawn by the Treasurer of the Association, countersigned by Glenn S. Warner, President. The Superintendent sees that no expenditures are made for anything that would be harmful to the pupils or injurious to the reputation of the school.

A short explanation of Mr. Stauffer's note should be made here. As leader of the band, he has purchased many new instruments and supplies for it, to be paid from money earned by the band at Long Branch, N.J. The city owes the band \$4000 for services rendered last summer under a contract. On the strength of the payment soon by the city of Long Branch, the band bought the instruments. Long Branch has not met its obligations and the band had to meet its obligations so their leader gave this note to the Athletic Club. The authorities feel sure that the \$4000 will soon be paid.

In concluding this report, I desire to say that Mr. Nori (an Indian) Chief Clerk and Mr. Miller, Bookkeeper, have cheerfully afforded me every assistance in their power and have been very helpful. Mr. Nori is a careful, painstaking young man and is well qualified for his position. His records are neatly kept and generally accurate

BAND ACCOUNT.

I have omitted to include in this report this " Band Fund". Like the Athletic Fund it was under the general supervision of the Superintendent of this school who merely approved the requisition for expenditures drawn by the treasurer and leader of the band, Mr. C. M. Stauffer. These expenditures each month and the receipts were audited by a committee composed of the president and the recorder of the Band Association both of whom are employees of this school. The expenditures cover a large number of miscellaneous items such as new uniforms, rental of costumes, tuition fee at Dickinson College for one of the members of the band, railroad transportation to points where the band gave a concert or played in a parade, board bills for the entire band at Long Branch during July and August and a division of the receipts among the boys of the band, which receipts were afterwards placed to their individual credits in the Merchants' National Bank. The receipts were derived from music furnished by the band on parades and \$6000 from the city of Long Branch under a contract with the band, reference to which has been made in this report in connection with the loan made to Mr. Stauffer from the Athletic Association Fund. The balance on hand January 31, 1908, was \$127.58.

These funds are not handled by the Superintendent and in my opinion should therefore not be accounted for by him.

PROPERTY ACCOUNTS.

In connection with my examination of the cash accounts here, I was orally directed to make an examination of the condition of the property accounts to which work I have given two days. To check up every item on the property return of this school would take six weeks or two months and I would have recommended such a course had I not been assured by Supervisor Dickson of his confidence in the property clerk, Mr. Kensler, after he had checked up some property with him. I have therefore taken articles here and there on the return and counted and checked them up. I gave very particular attention to all the subsistence stores counting and weighing them all and found the amounts fully accounted for with a small surplus in some instances. Articles of clothing were counted and found all right and in fact my short examination proved most satisfactory. Both farms were visited by me and the stock inspected and counted. There I found one horse more than is on the return which will be taken up unless my count is incorrect.

Mr. August Kensler who has charge of the property here is a most efficient and valuable employe. The only criticism I hear of him is that he is too particular and exacting. He looks after the property as though it were his own and I verily believe can tell you offhand just the number of any article on hand. I feel assured now after two days checking off that all the property shown by the return is here and in good condition excepting, of course, some worn out stuff which should be condemned.

In the course of my investigation I came across the following property:

Here is an expenditure of \$1053.40 for three machines that is absolutely thrown away. The cracker machine has never been used, the cake machine has been used a few times and the dish washing machine, two or three times and then all were discarded as impracticable. They are in good condition. They might be used at some other school.
