Sir:

Referring to Office letter "Education, 9659/09, JHD.", under date of February 11, 1909, and relative to money due William Newashe, I respectfully report that William completed a three year term of enrollment at this school during last year and that he was sent to his home in June.

After some correspondence with him relative to his reenrollment, he informed me under date of August 20th, last, that he had decided not to return to school. However, on August 30th he arrived at the school and asked to be admitted.

Several days later he came to me with a request that I should make arrangements to have him reimbursed for the expenses incurred in coming to the school as he had paid his own fare. Being under the jurisdiction of the Sac and Fox Agency in Oklahoma, I wrote to Superintendent Kohlenberg, giving the facts in the case and asking him to give William's request his consideration.

During the first week of January, while checking up

the applications for enrollment that had been received during the calendar year, it became evident that William's application had not been received and which oversight was partly due to the fact that he had come here of his own accord and the fact that he entered for reenrollment.

When asked to sign the application blank, it became evident to him that he could not be compelled to remain at school and in spite of the fact that he had asked to be readmitted and that he had accepted the gratuities of the school, he left the school and went to Hershey, Pa.

Before going away from school, he made the boast that he was going away so that he might receive his money and that he could have a good time for the summer at least.

When he made request for this money, I told him that it could not be turned over to him direct, as he is in a community now where some of our pupils are at home under the outing system and it was not deemed advisable to give him a chance to influence others by his spendthrift ways.

William is quite a young boy and was just in a position where he could have been given the very best of training at this school. He has a credit of \$466.14 in bank here and I respectfully recommend that this money should not be given into his hands, as it would not be giving the boy a fair chance to turn him loose with that amount and nothing definite in view.

Although we have enrolled all the students it is ad-

visable to admit for this school year, I would consider William's application for reenrollment. However, if he does not wish to consider that proposition, I respectfully recommend that the money should be turned over to his Superintendent and that it should not be given to him while he remains in this section of the country and where there is danger of his influencing our pupils while under the Outing System.

My Friend :

Your letter of the 4th instant was received, but I wished to learn the facts regarding you and the money which you ask to have paid to you, so that I might do what is best for your interests.

It appears that you returned to the Carlisle School from the Sac & Fox Reservation, using your own funds for transportation, and that, after being there a while requested reimbursement for your personal expenditure; that your request was submitted to Superintendent Kohlenberg for consideration, and that some weeks later you were asked to sign the necessary consent or application blank; that you refused to do that and left the school of your own accord, thus breaking faith with those who were interested in your welfare and trying to promote your interests.

It is assumed that you found employment at Hershey after you left the school. If so, your earnings should support you for the present. If not employed you should try to find something at once. Under the circumstances I do not feel that it would be

proper for Mr. Friedman to turn over to you your balance of \$466.14. If you are in actual need I should approve of his sending you a small amount, but there is no reason why you should put yourself in such a position. The money will therefore be held for you on deposit, to be turned over to you in such manner and at such time as the conditions warrant.

I suggest that you think the matter over and write to Supt. Friedman. If he is willing to let you return to the school on your signing the application blank and satisfying him that you are in earnest in your promise to conform to the rules, etc., I shall have no objection to his receiving you again.
