My dear Mr. Lipps:

The Office has received your letter of August 31, with reference to the money Herbert Sickles says he had to his credit when he left Carlisle School in 1906.

This young man also says in his letter of July 20, which was inclosed to you July 30 for report, that he left school owing to the sickness of his father, who later died from the same sickness. Can you find anything in the school records to show that Herbert Sickles left the school under these circumstances? If so, his case might not be covered by the instructions in Office circular of March 4, 1911, concerning Individual Indian Moneys in the hands of Government officers as custodians, copy of which is inclosed for your information.

Unless the case can be distinguished from ordinary cases of desertion, it seems that a refund must be made.

Your report and recommendations on this subject are requested.

Dear Sir,

Replying to Office letter dated Aug. 10th, relative to the funds of Herbert Sickles a deserter from this school, said funds aggregating 85.46 and which were credited to the Emergency fund as was customary at that time, I have to advise the records show this Emergency fund was enriched by thousands of dollars by deserting students. The money was used mainly in apprehending and returning to school deserting pupils and while it might be considered as "Indian Moneys Proceeds of Labor" and the expenditure considered proper under that caption, it would seem to be an embarrassing precedent to make this refund unless the office contemplates refunding to the hundreds of other pupils who might make application for their money when it would have become known that this was being done.

Replying to office letter dated July 30th, concerning the account of H.A. Sickles, I respectfully have to advise the records show that Herbert Sickles had an account showing a balance of 85.46 to his credit Nov. 6th, 1906. He deserted from school Dec. 2nd 1906 and the amount to his credit was transferred to the emergency fund Dec. 31, 1906. The emergency fund was a fund made up of monies of deserting pupils and used to apprehend and return these pupils to school. The money in question was of course expended as the emergency fund has long since been closed out.
