I have to advise that about twenty-five or thirty Individual Indian Money checks in small amounts were issued by this school some five or six years ago and are still outstanding. These checks were issued in small amounts, amounting to a few dollars, and in several instances we have been informed that the checks were destroyed as they were too small to cash. They are too small for the pupil to take the trouble and go to the expense in requesting a duplicate.

Please advise me if there is any way by which we may get rid of these little balances as it is necessary to continuously report them on our abstract of Individual Indian Bank Accounts.
