Sir:

Complying with instructions contained in Office letter of November 13, 1914, I am enclosing herewith voucher covering 72 pairs of shoes in the amount of \$97.20, in favor of Joseph M. Herman & Co., certified to by the former quartermaster and the former superintendent of this school.

This voucher was sent to the New York Warehouse for certification of inspection certificate on the back of invoice, with the explanation that the original invoice could not be found and that there were no blank invoices here at the school. The voucher was returned with the information that the "shoes in question did not pass through this warehouse, but were evidently ordered direct by ex-superintendent Friedman from Vendor for delivery at Carlisle."

The clerk in charge at the New York Warehouse failed to send me an invoice, and if he had I believe it would have been impossible to have gotten it signed, as the former quartermaster claims that these shoes could not have passed through his hands.
