Dear Sir: We have delayed replying to your letter of October 24th that we might carefully look this matter up. Abel's American Indian as Slaveholder and Secessionist, volume 1, was sent December 6th, 1915 and was paid for December 20, 1915. From the fact that it was paid for so soon after it was delivered, it seems to me that it must have been paid by personal check, as it would not have been possible for it to go through the necessary red taps to secure payment from the Indian School so promptly. We have no means, however, of telling whether this was a personal or a government check.

I have not been able to find the original order, although it is unquestionably somewhere in our files. We are short of help and I have not been able to put in as much time upon it as I could wish but if necessary we will make further search for the order. I thought perhaps by giving you the exact date of shipment and the exact date of payment for volume 1, might enable you to locate the payment either by the school or yourself. In any event we wish to what is entirely right in the matter and if the volume has been lost we will try to replace it although to do so would leave us with an imperfect set but once in a while we do have inquiries for the volumes separately, so may be able to dispose of them.

Referring to the inclosed letter relative to the purchase of books by Mr. John Francis, Jr., from the Arthur H. Clark Company, I have to advise that I knew nothing about this matter until I received a letter from Mrs. Francis, during last summer, advising that she had received Vol. 2, of this set, and had returned it to the company. Subsequent to which they wrote her insisting that she accept and pay for it, inasmuch as the first volume had been accepted and paid for.
