

Sir:

On May 27th, I sold a lot of dried bones and old iron for the sum of \$136.20 to Jacob Shields. Inasmuch as doubtless a large portion of the bones come from live stock, the product of the school, and a portion of the old iron was doubtless purchased from "Miscellaneous Receipts Class 4," or "Indian Moneys, Proceeds of Labor," I desire to ask the Office if it will not be permissible to take up these funds under "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 4," instead of "Miscellaneous Receipts, Class 1." Inasmuch as we are at present very anxious to be fully informed as to funds available for expenditure, I request an immediate answer if possible.
