Sir:

I have the honor to request approval of my action in selling three cows instead of two as authorized in Office letter of March 27, 1915 (32403-15). The disposal of these cows upon their becoming dry was recommended by the representatives of the Bureau of Animal Industry. Two of these cows sold for \$103.00, but one of them being very poor brought only \$27.69. The only bid that was received was from the Brelsford Packing & Storage Co., and their bid was 5¢ a pound for the two, and 3¼¢ for the poor cow, all f. o. b. Carlisle.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

The Office has received your letter of March 19, 1915, and in reply thereto authority is granted for you to drop from your property return two old cows which you say are "dry and barren, and are suitable only for beef." The disposition should be made either at public auction or through the medium of sealed bids. If the former method is employed, you should advertise sufficiently to insure competition, or an upset price which will be fair to the Government should be placed on the animals prior to the sale.

The proceeds of the sale should be taken up after consideration of Sections 282-297, Indian Office Regulations of 1904, together with the various amendments thereto.
