Sir:

The Indian Office has received through the Superintendent of the Carlisle Indian School a communication of March 6, 1913, from the representative of the Borough of Carlisle, Pennsylvania, requesting the permission of the Indian Service for construction of a sewer through land leased by the Carlisle School from A. P. Henderson and others, owners.

The land in question adjoining the school land is used by the Indian Service for pasture and hay land. A map is also submitted showing the location of the proposed sewer, and it is understood that the pipe line will be beneath the surface of the ground, well covered, and so laid as not to interfere with any drainage pipes of the school that are or may be placed in its vicinity.

The Department has no objection to the construction of this sewer through the leased premises, and assent is hereby given to the granting of an easement for the sewer by the lessors of the property to the Borough of Carlisle as shown on the map submitted (No. 3095), drawn by John C. Hiteshaw, Borough Engineer, the pipe to be laid and constructed as hereinbefore mentioned, and in such manner that it will not in any way interfere with the use of the premises by the lessee, in accordance with the terms of the lease.

My dear Sir:-

I beg to advise you that under the plans of the Borough of Carlisle for the introduction of sewerage, the route of the pipe at a point at or near the main entrance of the Indian School property passes from the latter, upon the meadow or pasture lands now in occupancy of the Indian School, under a lease from A. P. Henderson, et al., owners, and passes through said pasture or meadow land for a distance of 875 feet more or less south of the old channel course, passing between it and the line of the Indian School property within a few feet from the latter and practically parallel with it. - as indicated upon a plot or survey map herewith presented. Said points of passage being marked by letters A - B. That the course of said pipe line passes, as you will readily see, over a narrow strip of unimproved land, and is so located that little or no damage will result to either the owners or the lessee thereof; but before the former can grant the easement desired by the borough and release the latter from damages, permission will be necessary from the lessee, because of its rights under the present lease or any renewal thereof. The line of pipe will be beneath the surface of the ground, well covered, &c., and as I am assured,



laid so so as not to interfere with any drainage pipes of the school that may be located in the vicinity of the proposed sewer course.

I therefore respectfully ask the consent of the department on behalf of the lessors, to grant the easement or right of way referred to with the further understanding that any future renewals of the lease in question shall be made subject to such covenant or covenants as will fully protect the lessors in the premises.
