Dear Doctor:-

Owing to the resignation of my associate, Dr. Putts, I regret to say that I have been unable to go over the cases sent us from the Indian School, but I secured a report from the Attending Physician which I give you at this writing and endeavor to go over the cases later.

Mamie Rose it appears is classified as an Incipient case, condition, improved, and prognosis, good. Her admission weight was 121 lbs. Temperature, 98⁴, pulse 100, respirations, 30. Her present record, is weight 128 lbs., temperature, 98², pulse 86, and respirations 20. She does not cough or expectorate and two examinations of sputum have been negative.

Catherine Crowd, classified as Moderately Advanced, condition, improved, and prognosis, fair. Admission weight, 123 lbs., temperature 99, pulse 94, respirations 20. Present weight, 127 $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs., temperature 98⁴, pulse 86, respirations 20. Patient does not cough or expectorate and three examinations of her sputum have been negative for tubercle bacilli.

Wallace Hawke, moderately advanced, condition, improved, and prognosis, generally favorable. For the most part his temperature has been below 99, pulse and respirations approximately normal, and sputum reports from the Laboratory, negative. This patient has attained a gain in weight of $14\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. since admission, and is doing light work around the grounds.

Charles Thompson, Moderately Advanced, condition, improved and prognosis guardedly favorable. This patient has only a slight cough and expectoration, but on account of irregularity in the temperature, it was deemed advisable to discontinue the Tuberculin treatment. Since admission he has gained 11 pounds in weight, and doing light work around the grounds.
