I submit below a copy of a communication that has been handed me by Dr. A. R. Allen, Visiting Physician to this school:

"I wish to call your attention to the fact that at various points in the western part of the United States, on the various reservations, smallpox is epidemic. I think that the school should have prompt information of any outbreak of this disease at these various points so that any letters, etc., coming to the school, could be promptly fumigated here at the school before delivery to the addressee.

I would respectfully suggest that you ask the Department to notify you as soon as an outbreak of smallpox or any other contagious disease occurs at these various points so that we may take the proper precautions".

I believe that the Doctor's suggestions are practical and I submit them for such consideration as it may be possible to give them by the Office.
