

Sir:

J 31 C. P. F. I am transmitting herewith request for authority to expend the sum of \$200 to pay for dental work for students at the Carlisle school, who have no personal funds of their own with which to pay for same. I took this matter up with the Office informally last Saturday and was told that there is now no dentist in the Service available to send to Carlisle to do the dental work for the school. It was suggested that authority might be granted me to expend two or three hundred dollars in the employment of a local dentist to do this work.

Whenever our students have personal funds with which to pay for dental work, we require them to do so. Most of our students who have been here a year or more and have had an opportunity to earn money under the outing have funds with which to meet ordinary expenses of this kind. However, at the beginning of each school year we have a large number of new students some of whom have no funds with which to pay dental bills.

It will probably not be more expensive to the

Government to grant this authority and allow me to employ a local dentist to do this work than to send a dentist here for that purpose. In all probability, the traveling expenses of a dentist to come from the far West, where I understand most of them are now assigned, and their salaries would amount to more than the expense of employing a local dentist here to do the work.
