Sir:

Referring to your letter of September 28, 1908, requesting that the Bureau of Animal Industry of the Agricultural Department send an expert to make a thorough inspection of your school herd and apply thereto the tuberculin test, you are informed that information has been received to the effect that this test would be made on or about October 12th. The inference is that Dr. B. T. Woodward has reported at Carlisle and accomplished the inspection.

As it is usual for owners of cattle inspected to furnish transportation and pay the traveling expenses of the inspector from his official station to the place of making the inspections and tests and return, and to furnish him with meals and lodging while occupied in the work, you should pay Dr. Woodward his necessary expenses as outlined above and immediately submit a voucher to this Office for approval.

The Secretary of Agriculture.

Sir:

Under date of September 28, 1908 the Superintendent of the United States Indian Industrial School, Carlisle, Pennsylvania, reports that no inspection has been made of the dairy herd belonging to said school since June, 1907. He submits a request for the Department of Agriculture to send an expert in animal industry to make a thorough inspection of the school herd for the purpose of ascertaining whether any of the cattle are suffering from tuberculosis. I shall be glad to have you send an inspector to examine said herd at the earliest practicable date.

In this connection you are advised that the property return of the Superintendent of the school shows that at the close of the last fiscal year the school herd consisted of 60 cows, 22 calves, and 1 bull.

Sir:-

I respectfully report that no inspection has been made of our dairy herd with a view to ascertaining whether any portion is suffering from tuberculosis since June, 1907.

As it is generally recognized that infected cattle acts as a spread of tuberculosis among people who drink milk, I respectfully request that the Bureau of Agriculture send an expert in animal industry to make a thorough inspection of the school herd with a view to having the undesirable cows removed.
