Death of Katie Cochran.

Sir:

I respectfully report that late on Saturday night,
October the 23rd, there occurred in our School Hospital
the death of Katie Cochran, an eighteen year old full-blood
Pueblo girl who was enrolled at Carlisle on November the
28th of 1911.

On July 9th of this year the girl had to be brought in to the school from her Outing home and at no time after she was admitted to the School Hospital was it believed advisable to let her undertake the long trip to her father's home at Bibo, N. M.

The cause of death was tuberculosis in spite of all that was done to arrest the progress of the disease and to rebuild the girl's strength.

This morning at nine o'clock funeral services were conducted in the St. Patrick's Church in Carlisle, attended by all Catholic students, all Pueblo students and the de-

ceased's classmates as well as employees of this School.

In accordance with a telegraphic request received from Superintendent Lonergan's office at Albuquerque, N. M., the body was shipped to the father's home at Bibo, N. M., by prepaid express.
