in reply to the letter we received a few days
ago in regards the burial expenses of
my son, Isaac Longshore. when we received
the telegram of his death. it stated he died
at Wright Penn. we afterwards learned
he died at Carlisle. we wrote Mr
Leiffs at Chilocoos. in regards the matter
also of me a drawing of Isaac's trust funds
he said he thought the Department should
be entitled to pay the bill, and also I could
draw his money. as Isaac would of been
21 the 3rd of July. he died on Aug 24. 18
I wrote the Department about the matter but
never heard from it. in as much as we
had a total failure here last year, could not
the Department pay his burial expenses out of
his trust funds. I have heard that such has
been done. and shouldent I be entitled to draw
out the balance of his money. I sure hope that such
is so. Yours truly Annie Satterlee

This Office is in receipt of a letter from Mr. H. A. Ewing, funeral director at Carlisle, Pa. addressed to Mr. C. V. Peel, wherein he states that he has not received any money for the burial of your son, Isaac Longshore, who committed suicide last July at Carlisle.

The following telegram was received by the Superintendent of Carlisle Indian School in answer to a telegram asking what should be done with the body of Isaac Longshore:

Superintendent Johnson advises under date of July 15, 1918 in a letter addressed to Mr. C. V. Peel, Traveling Auditor in Charge, Carlisle Indian School, that the bill for burial expenses of your son had been forwarded to you.

Please advise this Office if you have received the bill for burial expenses and what preparations you have made to meet the obligation.

Sir:

There is enclosed a communication from H. R. Ewing, Undertaker of Carlisle Pa. regarding the payment of the funeral expenses of Isaac Longshore an Indian boy addressed to Mr Paul and forwarded without comment to me.

The case is as follows Isaac Longshore a former Carlisle student visited Carlisle in June 1918. He loafed around the town for several days and come out to the school where I personally noticed him and was informed of his history and the fact that he had been expelled from the school. As he merely walked about the plant and conducted himself in an orderly manner nothing was said to him. The next morning after his visit to the school

when I noticed him I was called up
 by phone and advised that Longshore
 had shot himself, and was about to
 die as a result. I immediately
 went to the ^{Orlyle} hospital where the lad
 had been taken but before I arrived
 he died. I awaited the arrival of the
 Coroner who deemed no inquest necessary
 and the body by my order was turned over
 to Mr Ewing. We immediately advised the
 Indian Office and the relatives of the
 lad. His step father advised me, by wire
 as I remember it, not to send the boy's
 body home but to bury him at Carlisle
 and he would meet the expenses. In
 view of these instructions and the fact
 that this Indian boy had to be
 buried I arranged for a decent funeral
 in the school grave yard with Mr Ewing.

I explained to Mr Ewing the situation
 as to his payment for this funeral and
 assured him that I would assist him

first by trying to get payment from the Indian father of the boy as per his agreement or in the event he didn't meet the expense I would put the claim up for payment under the Appropriation Relief and Distress 1918 as the boy didn't have ~~a cent~~ but a few cents, just a penny or two, which the Crown took possession of on his person.

Within a week or so I left for the Army. Apparently the father in law of Aaron Longshore never met the bill. Possibly no effort was made to collect from him. The Carlisle files should show the correspondence regarding this case. Mr. Denny handled it. The claim is a just one. Some one had to care for this Indian boy who was crossed because a white woman had deserted him as I remember. His relatives told ~~me~~ ^{me} to bury him and I instructed Mr. Ewing to do it.

As after proper effort the bill can't

be collected from Lyndon further in
law the question of ~~payment~~ payment
by the government should be
considered and if after careful consideration
this can't be done I will be glad
to know it so that I can settle
any question of my personal responsibility
with Mr Ewing.

My dear Mrs. Satterle:-

This morning I attended the funeral of your son Isaac and although I do not know you, I feel that perhaps you would like it if some mother would write you the particulars of your boy's death.

Isaac came to the Indian School Sunday morning from New Jersey where he said he had been working. He came to see Mr. Denny and talked with him for several minutes. You may not know that Mr. Denny has charge of the Small Boys' Building where Isaac used to stay when he was a pupil here. He talked very strangely, Mr. Denny said. He talked religion and about the war and what Billy Sunday said and quoted from the Bible. He was very nervous and told Mr. Denny that he had trouble where he was working but he did not tell him any particulars. Mr. Denny told him to walk about the school grounds and that he would see him later after we had had our breakfast. He was on the school grounds all day. Mr. Denny told him he would better find lodgings some where for the night so it seems Isaac went to town to stay Sunday night.

Early Monday morning he was at the school office and talked with one of the clerks. He was still talking about the war. He went away before the superintendent and the other clerks including myself, came to the office. At about 9:30 A.M. some one phoned out to Mr. Denny and that an Indian boy had shot himself on the streets of the town. Mr. Denny was in town then and was told at once what had been done so he got in an automobile and went directly to the hospital where they had taken Isaac and got there the same time the ambulance did. He saw him taken in and was there when he died. He lived just about ten minutes after he was taken to the hospital but he was unconscious all that time.

Several people saw him do the dreadful act. He spoke to a little girl standing on the street and said "Goodbye little girl" and waved his hand godbye to some people passing in a machine. Mr. Francis, the superintendent and Mr. Duran, the large boys' disciplinarian went to the hospital as soon as they could get a rig and gave all directions as to what should be done with the body. He instructed me to wire you and Mr. Johnson, which I did at once.

The funeral was to have been held yesterday but Mr. Francis had a letter from the father, C.M. Longshore, asking particulars and he did not like to bury the boy until he was sure that the father did not want the body. The father wired late last evening that we should comply with your instructions so we buried the body this morning, in the little school grave where we have laid many of the boys and girls whom have died far away from their parents.

There were only a few of us at the funeral, all of the Indian employees at the school, one of the teachers, who knew his sister at Haskell, the six pall-bearers and Mr. Francis. The services were conducted by the Presbyterian minister in one of the rooms of the undertaking establishments. He read the service and then offered a beautiful prayer. When the service was over, he was brought out to the school grounds.

Isaac looked as if he were asleep. The place where he had shot himself in the temple was hidden by his hair, which you know was always beautiful. His face was in repose and he looked natural except that I missed the light in his eyes. You know he had beautiful eyes too and I was not accustomed to seeing him with his eyes closed. He had on a very nice-looking suit of clothes. His casket was beautiful. It was white all over, covered with a white brocaded velvet and lined inside with white silk. The knobs were nickel plated, they looked almost like silver. I know Mrs. Satterle, that you would have been pleased with the way the undertaker took care of him. The school furnished the flowers so everything was done as I know you would liked to have had it done.

I have a little son five years old. I am sorry for you, dear mother, but you understand from the first part of my letter that Issac was not himself. There was something wrong but we did not find out what that was. Perhaps after all, he might have done harm to some one else than he would have had to suffer consequences which might be worse than what befell him. We feel quite sure that he did not commit this act when he knew what he was doing. My early training was that we should not take life but under conditions such as your boy had, I believe the Maker of us all would forgive him. I know he will.

Mr. Denny and I extend to you our sincerest sympathy.




