

The receipt is acknowledged of your letter of July 18 enclosing a newspaper clipping and bill-poster used by the aggregation of ball players styling itself "The Carlisle Indians".

The enclosures have been carefully considered in connection with previous correspondence with you on the subject, and in view of the fact that the newspaper clipping enclosed with your letter of the 18th appears to be in the nature of a news item father than an advertisement, and that the poster used by the ball players makes no reference to a Government Indian school, the Office is still of the opinion that it would not be justified in calling this matter to the attention of the Department of Justice, as the evidence at hand is considered entirely insufficient upon which to predicate an injunction bill.

It is realized that great injury will result to your school if the public are led to believe that

you as to the offensive actions of this and other similar organizations for use in case legal action becomes necessary or advisable.

whether or not the Indians ever did or did not attend the Carlisle School and there are no grounds shown for any criminal action against them, either in the State or Federal Courts. The Office hardly feels justified, at present at least, with the meager information and evidence, in asking the Department of Justice to institute proceedings in equity to have an injunction issued restraining them from using the name of the Carlisle School. It would be well, however, for you to collect all complaints and reports received by

these ball players are representative of the Indian youth at Carlisle. Therefore, it is suggested, in view of the fact that the team was scheduled in the New York Sun olipping to play in New York City on July 16, and is no doubt still in that vicinity at this time, that you make an effort to locate it and then detail a competent employee to visit the town in which it is scheduled to play and obtain all pertinent evidence practicable, including the names of the individual members, in order that it may be determined whether or not these ball . players ever attended the Carlisle school and there are sufficient grounds to warrant the Department of Justice taking action. If possible, affidavits should be obtained to the effect that these people are advertising themselves as members of the Carlisle Indian School of Pennsylvania.

A letter is this day being addressed to Mr. Frank Screnson, Superintendent of the Chicago Indian Warehouse, requesting him to visit the addresses in Chicago given in Mr. C. E. Baker's letter and endeavor to obtain all information possible.
