I wish to respectfully call the attention of the Office to my letter of July 31st. replying to Office letter of July 29th. 1916, bearing above data, which requested that I make investigation regarding an aggregation of ball players touring the country under the leadership of Mrs. Kate J. Becker, and to make report to the Office.

I find upon further examination of my letter of the 31st. that an error was made in statement contained in first paragraph of same and I wish to apologize for furnishing incorrect information in the matter, as owing to the rush to get the mail ready for the clerks to send out so that they would not be delayed beyond quitting time, the error was passed over without being detected.

I wish to state in accordance with information secured by me that Mrs. Kate J. Becker who lives at #301 South Halsted Street, is well known in that locality, but there seemed to be no

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of Office letter of July 29, 1916, bearing above data, instructing me to obtain all information possible regarding an aggregation of ball players styling themselves the "Carlisle Indian Base Ball Club" which was said to be touring the country under the leadership of a woman calling herself Mrs. Kate J. Becker (or Gage), and in connection therewith would respectfully advise that I called at the address given, viz : #301 South Halsted Street, this city, and that no one there seemed to know anything about the woman or base ball club in question, or was able to give me any information relative thereto.

I also called at the office of the Chicago Show Printing Co., #14 North Fifth Ave., and was advised that they had printed the posters for the base ball club referred to, but they assured me that this aggregation had been disbanded and was no longer in existence, and that Mrs. Kate J. Becker was now touring

the country with a so-called "Bloomer Girl Base Ball Club", and that this last named aggregation had yesterday played a game at Minneapolis.

It would seem from the information given me by the printing company that the so-called "Carlisle Indian Base Ball Club" was no longer in existence, and I am therefore, unable to obtain any information as to names of parties composing the club or any schedule of future games to be played by it.

INDIANS IN HARLEM.

Carlisle Nine to Meet Lincoln
Giants This Afternoon.

Two games that should draw a packed house to Olympic Field, 136th street and Fifth avenue, are on tap for local fans this afternoon. The double header will bring together the New London Club and the Lincoln Giants in the curtain raiser, and the Carlisle Indians and the Lincoln Giants in the feature game. The New London Club played the Harlem crew this season and it was not until the ninth inning that the Harlemites scored two runs, enough to win by the margin of a run.

The contest with the Carlisle Indians will be worth going a long way to see. The game will be the first played on a Sunday in Manhattan in three years in which a team of Redskins tackled a local semi-pro nine. The Indians are members of the famous Government school in Pennsylvania. They have a splendid record and are likely to force the Lincolns to play faster ball than ever to annex the laurels.

The poster used by this base ball club, which contains a group picture of the players, is printed by the Chicago Show Printing Co., 14 N. Fifth Avenue.

The Office desires to obtain all information possible regarding these people for use in injunction proceedings if the evidence warrants it. It is therefore requested that you make a diplomatic visit to the addresses herein mentioned and endeavor to obtain the correct names of all parties composing this ball club, including a schedule of all future games to be played if it can be obtained, and report to this Office the results.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

The receipt is acknowledged of your letter of July 18 enclosing a newspaper clipping and bill-poster used by the aggregation of ball players styling itself "The Carlisle Indians".

The enclosures have been carefully considered in connection with previous correspondence with you on the subject, and in view of the fact that the newspaper clipping enclosed with your letter of the 18th appears to be in the nature of a news item rather than an advertisement, and that the poster used by the ball players makes no reference to a Government Indian school, the Office is still of the opinion that it would not be justified in calling this matter to the attention of the Department of Justice, as the evidence at hand is considered entirely insufficient upon which to predicate an injunction bill.

It is realized that great injury will result to your school if the public are led to believe that

My dear Mr. Lippe:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of April 23 transmitting a newspaper clipping and a communication received by you from Mr. C. E. Baker, Hotel Deming, Terre Haute, Indiana, relative to a certain base ball organization using the name of your school to advertise itself.

There is nothing in the papers to show whether or not the Indians ever did or did not attend the Carlisle School and there are no grounds shown for any criminal action against them, either in the State or Federal Courts. The Office hardly feels justified, at present at least, with the meager information and evidence, in asking the Department of Justice to institute proceedings in equity to have an injunction issued restraining them from using the name of the Carlisle School. It would be well, however, for you to collect all complaints and reports received by

these ball players are representative of the Indian youth at Carlisle. Therefore, it is suggested, in view of the fact that the team was scheduled in the New York Sun clipping to play in New York City on July 16, and is no doubt still in that vicinity at this time, that you make an effort to locate it and then detail a competent employee to visit the town in which it is scheduled to play and obtain all pertinent evidence practicable, including the names of the individual members, in order that it may be determined whether or not these ball players ever attended the Carlisle school and there are sufficient grounds to warrant the Department of Justice taking action. If possible, affidavits should be obtained to the effect that these people are advertising themselves as members of the Carlisle Indian School of Pennsylvania.

A letter is this day being addressed to Mr. Frank Sorenson, Superintendent of the Chicago Indian Warehouse, requesting him to visit the addresses in Chicago given in Mr. C. E. Baker's letter and endeavor to obtain all information possible.

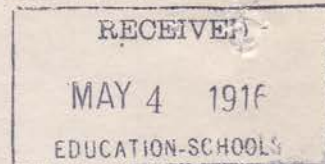

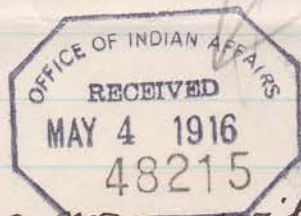
