My dear Mr. Schimfessel:

Your letter of April 20, addressed to the Athletic Coach. Carlisle School, has been referred to this Office for reply, since the Carlisle School was discontinued as such in 1918, when it passed under the control of the War Department.

The Office regrets that it has no information available relative to Indian baseball players who might desire to become members of your team. However, it is probably that the Assistant Superintendent in Charge of the Haskell Institute, Lawrence Kansas, or the Superintendent of the Chilocco Boarding School, Chilocco, Oklahoma, may be able to furnish you with the names of some eligibles.

In this connection it may be appropriate to state that this Office while not desirous of depriving any young Indian of an opportunity of earning money through the exercist of any athletic ability which he may possess, would not be inclined to favor their participation in such events unless there was reasonable assurance that the revenue derived from their efforts would suffice to assure their ability to return to their homes at the close of the baseball season.
