# Rules for Inspection.

The Weekly Inspection Committees will govern themselves by the following rules:

- 1-Notice particularly the condition of the walks, courts, and grounds immediately surrounding the buildings.
- 2—Observe the porches, banisters, staircases, halls, walls, ceilings, doors, and windows.
- 3-Examine all beds, bureaus, wardrobes, boxes, and other articles in the students' rooms.
- 4—Take special note of the general appearance of each room, and offer suggestions as to a better arrangement of the furniture and wall decorations.
- 5—Jot down any lack of discipline or irregularity seen or heard among the students; observe their neatness and cleanliness, and take the name of any student who seems to be indisposed.
- 6-Inquire particularly into all things that it seems ought to be improved.
- 7—Trace any apparent waste and suggest remedial measures.
- 8-Make note of any repairs or structural improvements needed.
- 9—See that the chairman of the committee has in his possession, before leaving the building inspected, the criticisms and suggestions gathered during the inspection.
- 10—The first person named on the committee will act as chairman. Although a written report is not expected each week, the chairman should report in writing to the Superintendent any suggestions or criticism deemed necessary.
- 11—No member of an inspection committee shall absent himself or herself from inspection without the written consent of the Superintendent. In which case, the written excuse must be sent to the office of the building to be inspected in time for the chairman to read it before the inspection begins.
- 12—The Disciplinarian and Matron shall accompany the Inspection Committee through Quarters, and make a note of all criticisms made by the committee.

8. That unexcused absence from three regular society meetings during the year will be deemed sufficient cause for preventing the class promotion of any member of a society.

#### WORK REQUIRED.

9. Satisfactory Literary Society work will be required from each student in the departmental and business classes. Failure along these lines will be deemed sufficient cause for demotion, or the prevention of promotion.

#### OFFICIAL VISITORS.

10. That no official visitor shall absent himself or herself from the meetings as scheduled without the consent of the Superintendent, in which case the official visitor will provide a substitute.

## QUESTIONS FOR DEBATE.

11. All questions for debate for regular meetings must be approved by the advisory member and all questions and contestants for public meetings must be approved by the Superintendent before further action is taken thereon.

# Instructions to Teachers.

## The Marking System.

The following instructions apply to all academic work. Teachers will thoroughly acquaint themselves with the system herein set forth, the same being in use at the present time in several of the best educational institutions in the United States, especially those under the immediate control of the United States Government.

Teachers will also see that their pupils become familiar with the system; and above all, will do all in their power to have the student do such work as the system calls for, viz., nothing but the student's very best efforts and this not one day but every day.

The marks obtained by Department students in the different branches will be posted on the bulletin board each month. Those for all other grades will be posted by their respective teachers in their respective school rooms.

Let us remember, however, that "Not Failure but Low Aim is Crime."

- 2. A mark of 7 shall represent the minimum of proficiency; and students whose final average for the term or year in any branch falls below that number shall be reported to the Principal Teacher as deficient in that branch. This applies to conduct also.
- Any student absent without proper authority from a recitation, examination, or exercise shall receive 0 as his mark.
- 4. Any student who shall fail to hand in a theme or other work at the time specified by his instructor shall be considered to have made a total failure, and shall be marked accordingly.
- 5. Any student, who, at an examination, recitation, or exercise, or in the preparation of a theme, shall copy from another, or shall receive any unauthorized assistance, written, printed, or oral, or shall attempt to obtain such

assistance, or shall be found with any unauthorized printed or written matter in his possession relating to the subject of the recitation or exercise, shall receive 0 as his mark.

- 6. In all cases, except those mentioned in articles 3, 4, and 5, where 0 is given as a mark, the instructor giving the mark shall inform the student of the fact.
- 7. Unless otherwise directed by the Principal Teacher, averages shall be computed in the following manner: Whenever a student shall receive more than one mark during the week in any branch, the arithmetical mean of such marks shall constitute his weekly average in that branch. The mean of the weekly average in any month, combined with the examination mark, if monthly examinations are held, shall constitute the monthly average. The mean of the monthly averages for the term, combined with the semi-annual or annual examination mark, shall constitute the final average for the term; and when the same subject continues through both terms, the mean of the final term averages shall constitute the final average for the year. The final average shall be the final mark.
- 8. When the number of recitations made by a student in any study during a month shall not exceed the number of recitations assigned to the study for one week, the final mark for the month shall be determined by adding the mean of all the marks received during the month for recitations to the mark received for the examinations, and dividing the sum by 2, thus:

$$M=\frac{m+e}{2}$$

- 9. When a student shall make less than two recitations during a month in any study, the mark received for the recitations shall be thrown out, and the mark received for the examination shall be his final mark for the month.
- When monthly examinations are not held, the final mark of a student for a month shall be the mean of the weekly averages.
- 11. When the number of recitations made during a month by a student, in any study in which monthly examinations are not held, shall not exceed the number of recitations assigned to the study for one week, the final mark for the month shall be the mean of the marks received for the recitations, and shall have only half the usual weight in determining the mark for the term.

- 12. When a student shall make less than two recitations during a month, in any study in which monthly examinations are not held, the mark received for that recitation shall be thrown out, and the student shall have no mark for that month in that study.
- 13. When the weekly mark of any student consists of a mark for a single recitation, in a study which has more than one recitation a week, the mark shall be considered as having one-half the weight of the average for any other week, except in the cases provided for in paragraphs 8, 9, and 11.
- 14. Weekly averages shall be recorded to the nearest tenth, all other averages to the nearest hundredth.
- 15. If two members of a class have the same average in any branch for a month, term, or year, they shall receive the same class number, and their names shall be placed alphabetically.
- 16. In marking examination papers or other written exercises, in all departments account shall be taken of the form, language, and spelling, as well as of the subjectmatter, and cases of gross carelessness shall be reported to the Principal Teacher.
- 17. At the end of each academic month marks will be assigned for conduct in accordance with the number of demerits received during the month. The monthly report card should show Conduct, (a) school, (b) quarters.
- 18. A Merit Roll, showing the names of all pupils in the class, will be posted in each school room and demerits promptly marked thereon in strict accordance with the rules set forth for such marking.

#### BUSINESS DEPARTMENT.

The standard required for graduation from the Academic Department shall be the standard required for admission to the Business Department.

Entrance examinations will be given to candidates who are graduates of other schools.
