Subject; Complaint of Two Moons. Tongue River Agency, Lamedeer, Montana, October 23/1907.

Hon. Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D.C.

Sir; -

Replying to "Education 77889-1907, File 820, October 5,1907" I have the honor to report that the children encolled for the party that arrived at Carlisle February 28/1907 were gathered under circumstances altogether fair and open. For a week or more preceding the departure of the party the ölder Indians of the reservation residing in the section from which the greater number of the children gathered were drawn held meetings in which they spoke enthusiastically in support of the movement to have their well grown children leave the reservation to go to school. Fully one hundred and fifty Indians were at the Training school the day before the departure of the children and lit can be truthfully said that a holiday spirit pervaded the business of collecting this party of children from first to last.

There was not with any of the Indians the slightest doubt as to what was the intention in forming the party. In every case where the child was under eighteen years of age the parents or one of them if living was at the school to say good bye to their children or said good bye to them at the agency a day or two before the departure of the party.

No complaint other than that of Two Moons ever came to

the agency office and since the receipt of the above referto office letter I have had a conversation with Two Moons
in the presence of Supervisor Pringle in which he stated at
that he harbors no resentment in the matter toward the super
intendent. Two Moons is one of the older men. His son was
23 years of age. He was a serious young man and a good work
er who said that he wished he could learn English for the
good it would be to him. It was considered that on account
of his age, the was qualified to sign his own consent blank
and as he only decided to go of his own free will and choice
at the last moment the matter of referring the subject to
his father was not considered as necessary. The children at
Carlisle are writing letters home to their parents that show
that they are happy in their school experiences.

It is most unfortunate that Geroge Two Moons died. There was no sign of weakness about him, in fact he was regarded as the stuggiest constitution among the number enrolled.

I saw Two Moons many times after the boy left the reservation and he made no mention of his dissatisfaction until after he was depressed by the death of his son. I think that it would be impossible to form a party of children that would leave more home happily and with such good nature on the part of the parents have did this party.

Enrolment of George Two Moons at Carlisle.

Two Moons,

Busby, Montana.

My Friend :

Thave been investigating your complaint regarding your son, who, you informed me, was taken to the Carlisle School without your consent and a few months later returned home so sick that he died soon after; also your statement that the parents of other children who were taken to Carlisle at the same time are very much dissatisfied.

Both Supt. Mercer, of the Carlisle School, and Supt. Eddy, of the Tongue River Agency, have made reports to me. I quote from Supt. Eddy's report, which has just been received:

For a week or more preceding the departure of the party the older Indians of the reservation residing in the section from which the greater number of the children gathered were drawn held meetings in which they spoke enthusiastically in support of the movement to have their well grown children leave the reservation to go to school. Fully one hundred and fifty Indians were at the Training school the day before the departure of the children and it can be truthfully said that a holiday spirit pervaded the business of collecting this party of children from first to last.

There was not with any of the Indians the slightest doubt as to what was the intention in forming the party. In every case where the child was under eighteen years of age the parents or one of them, if living, was at the school to say good bye to their children or said good bye to them at the agency a day or two before the departure of the party.

The children at Carlisle are writing letters home to their parents that show that they are happy in their school experiences.

It is a rule of the Office that Indians who have reached the age of 21 years may be enrolled in a nonreservation school without the consent of their parents, provided there is no other reason than this want of consent to withhold the privilege of further schooling at Government expense. It appears that your son George was anxious to have fore education and that Supt. Eddy thought him worthy. Ordinarilly, young men of his age, 23, are supposed to have passed the school period, and unless there is reason to expect serious application on their part, their transfer to distant schools is not favored.

I regret exceedingly that your son's career was cut short and can understand your sorrow. I cannot see, however, that any blame attaches to either Supt. Mercer or Supt. Eddy, their part being only

in furtherance of his commendable wish for better preparation to live and be useful.

As it appears that the remainder of the party taken to Carlisle along with your son are happy in their school life, that part of your letter is answered.

The Honorable,

The Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C.

Sir:



I am in receipt of your Office letter (Education 75323/07) dated the 19th instant, from the Acting Commissioner of Indian Affairs, inclosing letter from Two Moons of the Tongue River reserwation, Montana, complaining that his son George Two Moons was taken away from the reservation and brought to Carlisle by the agent without his (Two Moons') consent. Complying with Office request for a full report upon the statements contained in the letter of Two Moons, you are advised that this young man was brought to Carlisle on February 28, 1907, with a party of 31 or 32 other members of the Cheyenne tribe from the Tongue River Agency by the superintendent, J. R. Eddy, who collected the party and procured all the required papers and consents in connection with their enrollment at Carlisle; that according to our records the said George Two Moons was 23 years of age at the time of his enrollment here; that the required consent in his case was signed by himself and duly witnessed by Elmore Littleshield, an employee, I believe, on the reservation; that soon after his arrival at Carlisle, George Two Moons developed marked symptoms of tuberculosis which were later confirmed without question by our school physician, and that on May 27th he was discharged from the school and returned to his home,

where he died, according to information received later.

Proper consents and enrollment papers were brought by Supt.

Eddy for all the members comprising the party above referred to,
and up to this time no complaint has been made by parents or others
interested in any of these pupils to the effect that proper consent for
the enrollment here had not been previously obtained. Further than
this I am unable to make answer to the charge that many of the
Indians there on the reservation are complaining that their children "were stolen from them and taken away to school."

The most of the pupils in question are now doing very well indeed and are happy and contented, and it is believed that their own welfare and the welfare of their people at home will be prothese children moted by putting in a term at Carlisle.

The letter of Two Moons is herewith returned.
