Sir:-

Replying to your communication of January 17, Education, 2872-1908, File 820, I have to say that Charles Honyoust was enrolled December 10, 1902, for five years; under Paragraphs 232 & 233, Rules, I.S.S., he will not be eligible for discharge until June 30, 1908, however, there is no particular reason why he should remain for the balance of the year, as he is, I believe, as well able to take care of himself now as he will be then. He is a good boy, and I believe will be able to take care of himself and help his people, and as it appears that he is needed at home, I recommend that I be authorized to discharge him and send him home.

of the Carlisle Indian School for nearly six years. During
which time he has not visited his home which is situated
a mile north west of Waltham, Wabasha County. His mother
his young man. Nancy Shumboos is now in poor health
and has been for about one year or more. When she was
first taken sick I called the Superintendent to allow the
boy to come home for a short time which request was
refused. We are very anxious that the boy should make
his and especially his mother a visit just as soon as
possible for it is not expected that his mother will
live but a short time and if would seem too much
not to allow him to see her before death. Her age is 57
and her troubles are of an internal nature I refer to
mother to you for the reason that the Superintendent did
not feel that the boy could be allowed to go home.
