Sir:

Your letter of the 6th instant has been received concerning the advisability of sending to their homes William King from the Panguitch School, and Garfield Sitarangok from Golavin Bay, Alaska, on account of pulmonary tuberculosis.

You are authorized to return William King as recommended, after arrangements have been made with the superintendent of the Panguitch School.

Regarding funds for the transportation of Garfield Sitarangok, you are referred to Office letter of April 1, 1907, in which the following section from the Indian Appropriation Act for the fiscal year 1908 was cited:

For collection and transportation of pupils to and from Indian schools, and also for the transportation of Indian pupils from all the Indian schools and placing of them, with the consent of their parents, under the care and control of such suitable white families as may in all respects be qualified to give such pupils moral, industrial, and educational training, seventy-five thousand dollars: Provided, That not exceeding five thousand dollars of this amount may be used, under direction of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, in the transportation and placing

of Indian pupils in positions where remunerative employment can be found for them in industrial pursuits. The provisions this section shall apply to native pupils brought from Alaska.

You will note that the last sentence declares the provisions of the section to be applicable to native Alaskan pupils. Its use, however, is not authorized to cover incoming transportation but return expenses only. It will be applicable in the case of this sick boy. As soon as transportation lines to Golavin Bay are opened and the physician thinks it advisable for him to undertake the journey, you have authority to send him.

Referring to your Office letter (Education 16391/1908, File 820) of March 21st, granting permission for the return to his home of Garfield Sitarangok, an Alaskan pupil who is in ill health, I have to say that Samuel Anaruk, another Alaskan whose period of enrollment will expire the coming summer, and whose home is near that of the other boy mentioned, wishes to go home with Garfield. I approve of this arrangement as it will relieve some of the tediousness of the long journey to allow them to travel together. I therefore recommend that permission be granted to send Samuel Anaruk to his home, the cost of his transportation to be paid in the same manner as that for Garfield Sitarangok.

Recommends that authority be granted to send two pupils home who are ill.

Sir:

Our school physician reports that Garfield Sitarangok, from Golavin Bay, Alaska, and William King from the Panguitch School, Utah, both have pulmonary tuberculosis, and he recommends that they be sent to their respective homes. I concur in this recommendation, but before taking action in the case of the Alaskan boy I deemed it advisable to submit the matter to you and secure the approval of your Office. We have no funds at present in our hands to pay for transportation of Alaskan children. It is understood that your Office has a fund for this purpose and I recommend that I be authorized to send both of these boys home and submit voucher for the expenses of the Alaskan boy to your Office for approval and settlement.
