Release of 'Amma Webster from Carlisle School & payment of money due her.

My Friend :

Referring to your several letters concerning Emma Webster, you are advised that Superintendent Friedman has advised the Office that he has sent her a check for the money remaining to her credit at the school, including the balance of the deposit which was to cover her return fore to Carlisle, and that during the summer he sent her other amounts on her request, for immediate use.

It appears also that Mr. Friedman interested himself in obtaining a position for her and expressed his willingness to release her
from the school. It therefore seems to the Office that your letters
in her behalf were unnecessary, as she was in direct correspondence
with Mr. Friedman and he was very prompt in his attention to her requests. As Miss Webster agreed to pay her transportation home if allowed to go home for a visit, and the money was used for that purpose,
Supt. Friedman has been advised that he need not reimburse her.

complete her term of enrollment, as correspondence with her would indicate, and from which I beg leave to quote.

Several days after her return to her home, she wrote a letter, stating that she found her parents in want, and both of them almost blind and requested that money should be sent to her at once. In reply, the following letter was written to her.

"I have your letter of the 26th, and am very sorry to learn of the conditions you describe. You are at home on leave of absence and under the rules, have no money to spend. However, you have always been a good girl here and I will make an exception in your case and enclose you a check for \$10.00. This, of course, will be made up from your earnings, when you return to School".

During the second week of August, Emma again wrote me from De Pere, Wis., again requesting that money should be sent to her, and stated that she would probably have to leave School, to go to work. I replied as follows:

"Several days ago I wrote you at Oneida, stating that I had been in receipt of a letter from the Department, asking me to recommend a girl for the position of assistant cook at the Lac du Flambeau School at a salary of \$300, and I advised in that letter that you should wire me whether you would accept or not. Your letter since then informs me that you are not at home, so am writing you this and I want you to let me know at once whether you would accept or not, so that I can notify the Department of your decision.

In regard to your leaving school, I shall write you again, if necessary, after your reply to this!

Under date of the 29th of August, Emma again wrote me as follows:

"I am very anxious to know when I am going to Lac du Flambeau Sch., as I have already accept this position. Let me know as soon as possible.

I wish you sent my money, as I will need it very much, if I have to pay my fare".

On Sept. 1st, I replied, stating:

"I am in receipt of your letter of the 29th ultimo, but must

inform you that I have not heard anything about your position at Lac du Flambeau, since I submitted your name to the Department. I understand from your letter, that the position has been offered you and that you have accepted, but as you are still on our rolls here, I am sending you but \$35.00 of your money, which should be sufficient to pay your fare and other necessary expenses. As soon as I hear definitely that you are appointed to the place, I can then discharge you from the school and we will send you the remainder of your money.

Trusting that this may be satisfactory to you, etc., etc."

Under date of the 11th instant, Emma wrote me as follows:

"I received your letter and enclosed I found my check for \$35.

I am very glad to hear from you but I am very anxious to know if
Mr. Sickles does want a girl this fall. If not, please notify me
again soon, as I want you to give me a place to work in some school."

In reply to this I suggested that she should write to Mr. Sickles concerning the action that had been taken.

Under date of Sept.21st, she again requests that \$10.00 should be sent to her so that she could take her mother to the Fair at West De Pere.

Complying with instructions of Office letter above referred to, I am sending a check to Emma today, to cover the amounts of \$100.53 and \$20.42, - a total of \$120.95, but I respectfully recommend, that in view of all the facts in the case, and that she is discharged before the time of her enrollment has expired, that she should not be reimbursed for the \$19.58 that was used in paying for her transportation to her home.

Money due Emma Webster, an Oneida pupil - earnings, etc.

Superintendent, Indian Industrial School, Carlisle, Pennsylvania.

Sir :

The Office is in receipt of a communication written by Henry K. Cooper of West DePere, Wisconsin, for Abram Webster, relative to Mr. Webster's daughter Emma. The statements made in this letter are, briefly, as follows:

That Emma's period of enrolment at the school expired two or three years ago; that there are funds remaining due her in the bank, which she desires to have sent to her; that she paid her transportation home, amounting to about \$40, and understands that this or the amount of her own money used for transportation to her home should be refunded by the Government; that you expected her to return to Carlisle in the fall, but that she is needed at home; that she is 25 years old and is able to work out and earn her living when not obliged to stay at home to care for "the old folks".

The letter is somewhat mixed up, but it seems that the \$40 referred to was to cover her railroad fare back to the school.

Please make a report on these statements, showing what amount of money was to the credit of Emma Webster on your students' accounts

books, including the \$40 or whatever amount was reserved for transportation; what the agreement was regarding her return to the school, and whether or not her money has been withheld.

Your attendance report for the 4th quarter show that she is about 22 years old; that she was readmitted in 1905, and that she was in the sixth grade. On this showing I am inclined to the opinion that she has had about all the educational opportunities that the dovernment owes her; that ordinary aptitude, under the circumstances, should have advanced her in eight years beyond the sixth grade, and that she should be dropped as a pupil and her money sent her. If she paid her own way home, your recommendation as to whether the amount should be returned to her is desired. If she left a deposit to cover her return expenses to Carlisle, the circumstances seem to warrant its repayment to her along with the balance remaining to her credit at the time she left the school.

Please advise the Office on all these points at your early convenience, and tell what action has been taken on her request to you if such was made. Answer to Mr. Whester will await receipt of your report.
