Sir:

The Office is in receipt of a letter from Albert Exendine, dated February 5, 1909, relative to being dropped from the rolls of your school.

He requests that he may be allowed to finish his term at Conway Hall, Carlisle, Pa., having paid his tuition up to June 1, 1909.

In order to do this he pleads that he may be carried on the rolls of the Carlisle Indian school until June 1, 1909, at which time he says he will be able to take care of himself.

There will be no objections to his remaining on the school grounds, if there is no expense on his account from Government funds for his support, having been released from the school rolls by reason of ineligibility as to tribe.

Dear Sir:

Big to state that I have
been notified by Supt. Friedman that
I have been dropped from the roll
of the school.

I deem it proper at this time
to give you a little explanation
regarding my position. At present
I am attending school at Conway Hall
in town with the intention of
pursuing my studies further, if
possible. This is my last year
in the preparatory school, and I
desire to enter law school next
year. I have paid my tuition
in full for this term which will

If I shall be compelled to abide by your present ruling, I shall not be able to finish this year's course and thus be made to sacrifice my tuition and a very important part of my education. However if you could ^{favor} me by allowing me to continue on the roll of the school until the first of June, I know I shall be able to take care of myself from that time, by coaching foot ball. I have already received several very flattering offers for my services for next year.

Your actions in the matter shall probably determine my future life to a very great extent. If it is possible for you to assist me in any way, I shall be very thankful.
