Sir:

The Office is in receipt of your letter of March 24,
1909, asking authority to send home the following named pupils:

Martha Day,	Gallup, New Mexico,
Irene Brown,	Brown's Valley, Minnesota,
Tempa Johnson,	Cherokee, North Carolina,
Vosam Marco,	Charenton, Louisiana.

There is no reason why the two girls who are grad-
uates should not be sent home at once, and you have full author-
ity to arrange for their going. You have like authority to
send home Tempa Johnson, for the reasons set out in your letter.

In view of Vosam Marco's physical condition, author-
ity is granted for his return also.

In all cases where pupils develop tuberculosis they
should be sent home promptly, unless there is a very good pros-
pect that treatment which your school is equipped to give will
be effective; and strict segregation during treatment must be
enforced.

Sir:

I respectfully request that authority be granted me to return the following pupils to their homes at points indicated.

Martha Day	-	Gallup, New Mex.
Irene Brown	-	Brown's Valley, Minn.
Tempa Johnson	-	Cherokee, N. C.
Vosam Marco	-	Charenton, La.

Martha Day and Irene Brown are members of this year's graduating class and as they do not intend to return to school to continue their studies, they would not be materially benefited by remaining until the close of school in June.

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Tempa Johnson was enrolled at Carlisle on Aug. 21, 1904, and her term of enrollment does not expire until the end of this school year. Superintendent Kyselka recommends, however, that

she should be allowed to go home now in order to render much needed assistance to her sick mother.

Vosam Marco was enrolled at this school on July 22, 1908. On Febr. 9th he was admitted to the Hospital for treatment for rheumatism and has now developed unmistakable evidences of tubercular infection, and would soon prove to be a menace to the health of other pupils here.
