to it about him coming home but he has fail  
to come yet. or else the agent did not send for him  
my boys name is George Day. He belong here at  
Shawnee Indian Agency Oklahoma. We want him  
home to work as we are not able to work and besides  
to attend to his own affairs. He enrolled at the  
Carlisle Indian School Carlisle Penns.

Sir:

I am in receipt of your letter of April 3, 1909, concerning the request of Mrs. Susie Wilson of Shawnee, Oklahoma, for the return of her son George Day from your school.

It appears from your statement that George Day was at Carlisle three years and seven months under his first enrollment and about four months since his re-enrollment, making the full time at Carlisle nearly four years to date. It is not shown whether he wished to return to school or was simply returned as a deserter.

As long as the boy is doing good work and is satisfied, it is well to retain him, unless his mother really needs his help. It is noted that George is more than twenty-one years old. If the call from his home is urgent it may be wiser to allow him to return, especially as it seems that no consent blank was filed at the time of his second enrollment.

It is suggested that you talk the matter over with him and write his mother, Mrs. Susie Wilson, Tecumseh, Oklahoma.

You may consider this as full authority to send him home if he wishes to go.

Referring to Office letter "Education-Administration, 23152-1909, A.V.S.", under date of March 30 and relative to a request from Mrs. Susie Wilson of Shawnee, Okla. for the return home of her son, George Day, I respectfully report that this young man was originally enrolled at this school on February 2, 1903. He deserted from the school on September 2, 1906.

He was again reenrolled on December 19, 1908 for a full term upon his arrival here thru transfer by Superintendent Thackeray of the Shawnee School. This transfer was made without submitting his application to me for consideration.

He is now doing very well with his academic and industrial work and I respectfully recommend that he should not be returned to his home.

The Office has received a letter dated March 26, 1909, from Mrs. Susie Wilson, who says her boy, George Day, is attending Carlisle and she wants him home to work for her. She says that he has been at school six years; that he left his home at Shawnee, Oklahoma, when he was fifteen years old, and that he is now 21 years of age.

The attendance report of your school shows that the boy entered Carlisle December 19, 1908. Was this the date of his first entrance there?

Please report how long he has been at your school; for what length of time he was enrolled; how he is making use of his time, and whether or not you think he should be returned to his home as his mother requests.
