The Honorable, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C.

Sir:



I respectfully request that authority be granted me to return Lillian Otter Chief and Janet Jackson to their homes at Crow Agency, Montana and to Kooskia, Idaho, respectively, and to provide for an escort for the former as far as Kansas City, Missouri.

Janet Jackson was placed in Class I in the report made by Doctor Joseph Murphy, and it was not deemed advisable to keep her at school because of the danger of infecting other pupils from the tubercular sores that were constantly breaking out on her face and other parts of her body.

Lillian Otter Chief was out in the country when Doctor Murphy made his medical examination of our pupils. During the month of February she contracted a cold and when it resulted in a bad cough, her patron called in a physician who pronounced it as nothing serious.

Under date of March 15th her patron informed us that she seemed to be getting better and that she was planning to keep her all summer. She also informed us that she had again consulted



a physician and that he did not consider the girl afflicted with anything but a cough. We informed the girl's patron that if she did not see any sign of improvement in the girl's condition that she should send her to the school.

Under date of March 22nd the patron again wrote us saying that the girl seemed to be worse and we wired her at once
to send her in on Wednesday morning, March 24th. When she arrived at the school she was too weak to walk up stairs unassisted
and the school physician reported her in the last stages of
tuberculosis.

She was anxious to go home and with the hope that she might be given a lease of life for a few more weeks, it was deemed advisable to send her away at once. This was done on Friday evening, March 26th. The girl was too weak to help herself and the school nurse was sent as an escort as far as Kansas City.

In view of all these facts, I respectfully recommend that this authority be granted me as requested.
