Sir:-

I have your letter dated November 13th enclosing a letter from Lyman B. Madison of Menemsha, Massachusetts.

Regarding the case of Lyman B. Madison in which you ask for report, I enclose, under this cover, the application which he submitted. I am also enclosing you the application blank filled out by his sister. This young lady is not at present here, but, after a careful examination of her application blank, and the further consideration of her case, it was deemed advisable to grant her permission to enroll. A special reason of this action was because of the fact that these people now reside in a frontier district in Massachusetts where the schools are ungraded, and where no opportunities for industrial education are offered.

I believe it would be in the interest of these Indians to admit them to Carlisle for the purpose of complet-

ing their academic training and learning some definite trade.

I do not believe such action would be opposed to the general policy of your Office.
